Chapter 149.**CHAP. 149**

An Act to Incorporate the Sullivan and Sorrento Electric Light and Power Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

Section 1. Frank L. Trundy, Charles E. Hale, Harvard H. Havey, Bradbury Smith, Harvey W. Dunbar, Wolf Lipsky and Jesse K. Mitchell, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby made a body corporate by the name of the Sullivan and Sorrento Electric Light and Power Company, with all the powers, rights and privileges, and subject to all the duties and obligations conferred and imposed by law, except as otherwise provided herein.

Section 2. Said company is hereby authorized and empowered to furnish power for manufacturing and mechanical purposes; to generate, make, buy and sell, distribute and supply, electricity and electrical power for lighting, heating, manufacturing, mechanical and traction purposes, in the towns of Sullivan and Sorrento, in the county of Hancock; and may build and operate manufactories and works for the providing and supplying of electricity, light and power, and may lease, purchase and hold real and personal estate for the proper object of the corporation to the amount of five thousand dollars; and to construct, lay, maintain and operate lines of wires and other material for the transmission of electricity, under ground, upon, under, along and over any and all streets and ways in said towns under the direction of the municipal officers of said towns, and in public places in such a manner as not to endanger the appropriate use thereof; and to establish and maintain, under the direction of said municipal officers, all such posts, pipes, supports and appurtenances as may be necessary, and to terminate at such places in said towns as may be expedient.

Section 3. For the erecting of said wires above ground and for laying the same, or pipes thereof underground, or for taking up, replacing and repairing the same, said company shall first obtain the consent of the municipal officers of said towns and perform all said acts as directed by said municipal officers.

Section 4. Damages for any land or easement taken for the purposes of erecting or laying said lines, if the parties cannot agree, shall be estimated, secured and paid as in the case of lands taken for railroads.

Section 5. Nothing contained in this act will be construed to affect or diminish the liability of said corporation for any injury to private property, by depreciating the value thereof or otherwise, but any legal remedies existing shall continue.

Capital stock.

Section 6. The capital stock of said corporation shall be ten thousand dollars divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, of such classes as the shareholders may determine, and it may issue bonds to the amount of the capital stock issued and actually paid for, and secure said bonds by mortgages or deed of trust upon the property and franchises of the company, said capital stock may be increased from time to time as found necessary, in accordance with the provisions which are or may be in the revised statutes.

Section 7. Said corporation is authorized to contract with any firm, individual or corporation for the purpose of buying or selling power as the needs of its business may require or permit.

Section 8. Any two of the corporators named in this act may call the first meeting of the corporation by mailing a written notice signed by both, postage paid, to each of the corporators, seven days at least before the day of the meeting, naming the time, place and purpose of said meeting and a president, secretary, directors, and other necessary officers may be chosen, by-laws adopted and any corporate business transacted.

Section 9. This act may be accepted at any regular meeting of the corporation by a majority of the members present.

Chapter 150.

An Act to Amend Chapter One Hundred and Seventy-three of the Private and Special Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Eighty-seven, Relating to the Cornish Village Improvement Society, and to Make Valid the Organization of Said Society Incorporated Under Said Chapter.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1 of chapter 173 of P. & S. laws of 1887, amended.

Section 1. Section one of chapter one hundred and seventy-three of the private and special acts of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven is hereby amended as follows: Strike out the words "northerly line of lands of" and the words "and John P. Bradeen" in the eleventh line of said section and insert the word 'land' after the word "Thompson," and strike out the words "crossing said road to the north east" in the twelfth and thirteenth lines of said section and insert in place thereof the words 'by and across said road to the southerly,' so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Territorial limits of Cornish Village Improvement Society.

'Section 1. The territory embraced within the following limits: beginning on the west bank of Saco river, at the northeasterly corner of land of Elihu Parker, and thence running westerly by land of said Parker to land of heirs of James T.
