Chapter 51.

SEBEC-COLUMBIA-DANFORTH-STOCKHOLM.

Resolve, in Favor of the Town of Sebec.

Resolved, that the sum of one hundred and seventy-six dollars and sixty-six cents, be and hereby is appropriated, to be paid to the town of Sebec for money expended in support of Frank A. Lovering, an insane pauper.

Chapter 52.

Resolve, in Favor of the Town of Columbia.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of forty-four dollars and twenty-five cents (\$44.25) to reimburse the town of Columbia for money expended by it for pauper supplies furnished Austin Elsmore of Plantation Fourteen, county of Washington, in the year nineteen hundred and ten.

Chapter 53.

Resolve, in Favor of the Town of Danforth.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of three hundred and ninety-three dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$393.87) in favor of the town of Danforth for reimbursement for state pauper supplies furnished to Patrick Kinney from March twenty-sixth, nineteen hundred and seven to July first, nineteen hundred and nine.

Chapter 54.

Resolve, in Favor of the Town of Stockholm.

Resolved, that the sum of forty-five dollars be and hereby is appropriated, to be paid said town of Stockholm in the county of Aroostook, to reimburse said town of Stockholm for money expended for the burial of a stranger, found dead in a freight car on the twenty-third day of September, nineteen hundred and ten.
