Chapter 100.

Resolve, in Favor of a Road in Elliottsville Plantation.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum Elliotts-
ville, Pl., in
favor of
road in.
 of two hundred dollars to aid in the repair of the road leading
 from Wilson bridge in the plantation of Elliottsville, in Pis-
 cataquis County, to the Bodfish Valley Farm, so-called, near
 the head of Lake Onawa; the said sum to be expended under
 the direction of the state highway department.

Chapter 101.

Resolve, Providing a State Pension for Callie Mains.

Resolved, that there be paid to Callie Mains of Buxton, six Callie
Mains, to
provide
state pen-
sion for.
 dollars per month, payable quarterly, from the military fund
 for soldiers, beginning March first, nineteen hundred and thir-
 teen and continuing during the pleasure of the legislature and
 until otherwise ordered.

Chapter 102.

Resolve, for Reimbursing the Town of Talmage for Certain Money
 Expended for an Insane Pauper.

Resolved, That the sum of fifty-two dollars be and hereby Talmage,
town of, in
favor of.
 is appropriated to be paid to the town of Talmage to reim-
 burse said town for expenses incurred in investigating the
 case of William Casey, an insane pauper having no settlement
 within the state.
