sistent with the act of Congress relating thereto. The roads to be improved by said joint fund shall begin in the town of Fryeburg and extend through the towns of Bridgton, Naples, Casco, Raymond, Windham and the city of Westbrook to the Portland line near Riverton, so-called, in said Portland. If the above named route shall conflict with any ruling of the postmaster general or secretary of agriculture of the United States, the said highway department is hereby authorized to designate such other road or roads as shall meet the requirements of said postmaster general or secretary of agriculture.

Chapter 234.

Resolve, in Favor of the Bath Military and Naval Orphan Asylum for Maintenance and Repairs.

Resolved, that there be appropriated for the Bath Military and Naval Orphan Asylum of Bath, the sum of nine thousand dollars for the year nineteen hundred and thirteen and nine thousand dollars for the year nineteen hundred and fourteen, the same to be expended in maintenance of the asylum. And be it further resolved:

That an additional sum of five hundred dollars for each of the years nineteen hundred and thirteen and nineteen hundred and fourteen be appropriated for special repairs upon and upkeep of the buildings and equipment of said asylum.

Chapter 235.

Resolve, for Laying the County Taxes for the Year Nineteen Hundred Fourteen.

Resolved, that the sum annexed to the counties in the following schedule is hereby granted as a tax on each county respectively to be appropriated, assessed, collected and applied to the purpose of paying the debts and necessary expenses of the same and for other purposes of law, for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.

Chapter 236.

Resolve, in Favor of the Maine Industrial School for Girls for Medical Examination and Treatment with Supplies.

Maine Industrial School for Girls, in favor of.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sums of one thousand dollars for the year nineteen hundred thirteen, and five hundred dollars for the year nineteen hundred fourteen to be expended under the direction of the trustees of juvenile institutions for the purpose of supplying medical examinations and treatment with supplies for the inmates of the Maine Industrial School for Girls at Hallowell.

Resolve, for the Appointment of Commissioners to the International Celebration of the Opening of the Panama Canal.

Panama canal, for appointment of commissioners to celebration of opening of.

Resolved, that the governor, by and with the consent of the council, be and hereby is authorized and empowered to appoint not more than five commissioners to represent the State of Maine and its educational and industrial interests in connection with and at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition to be held at San Francisco in California in nineteen hundred and fifteen as authorized by the President and Congress of the United States to celebrate the completion and opening of the
