Chapter 236.

Resolve, in Favor of the Maine Industrial School for Girls for Medical Examination and Treatment with Supplies.

Maine Industrial School for Girls, in favor of.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sums of one thousand dollars for the year nineteen hundred thirteen, and five hundred dollars for the year nineteen hundred fourteen to be expended under the direction of the trustees of juvenile institutions for the purpose of supplying medical examinations and treatment with supplies for the inmates of the Maine Industrial School for Girls at Hallowell.

Chapter 237.

Resolve, for the Appointment of Commissioners to the International Celebration of the Opening of the Panama Canal.

Panama canal, for appointment of commissioners to celebration of opening of.

Resolved, that the governor, by and with the consent of the council, be and hereby is authorized and empowered to appoint not more than five commissioners to represent the State of Maine and its educational and industrial interests in connection with and at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition to be held at San Francisco in California in nineteen hundred and fifteen as authorized by the President and Congress of the United States to celebrate the completion and opening of the

Panama Canal; in which celebration the United States Government has invited all nations to participate. Such commissioners shall so be selected as collectively to possess knowledge of the educational and industrial interests of the State of Maine adequate to equip the commission to determine and announce the plan, scope and prospects of said exposition and the intellectual and material values it offers or probably will offer which may and should be accepted and availed of by citizens and industries of this state. It shall be within the province of such commissioners, with the approval of the governor and council, to arrange and prepare for a representation of the history, progress, industries and resources of the State of Maine at said exposition. The commissioners hereby authorized shall serve without compensation.

Resolve, in Favor of Edward W. Murphy for Expenses of the Committee Appointed by the Seventy-fifth Legislature to Investigate Methods of Distributing the State School Funds.

Resolved, that there be, and hereby is, appropriated to be paid to Edward W. Murphy the sum of four hundred and nineteen dollars and fifty-one cents for the expenses of the special committee appointed by the seventy-fifth legislature to investigate methods of distributing the state school funds.

Chapter 239.

Resolve, Relating to the Trust Fund Held by the State for the Penobscot Tribe of Indians.

Whereas the report of the state auditor for the years nineteen hundred seven and nineteen hundred eight shows that through errors in the charging up of interest and in proper crediting of other items, the books of the state treasurer on December thirty-first, nineteen hundred eight, did not show the correct amount in the hands of the state held in trust for the benefit of the Penobscot tribe of Indians; that the amount in said fund as it appeared on the books of the treasurer on said December thirty-first, was seventy-two thousand, three hundred twenty-eight dollars and forty-eight cents, while according to said auditor's report the correct amount in the hands of the state in said fund was eighty-nine thousand, five hundred ninety-two dollars and forty-four cents, and
