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CHAP. 182

Chapter 182.

An Act Directing the Treasurer of State to Correct the State Treasury Records for the Years Nineteen Hundred Eight and Nineteen Hundred Nine, Relating to the Payment of State, County and Forestry District Taxes on One Forty-eighth Part of Township Number Two, Range Nine, West from the East Line of the State, in Piscataquis County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

The Treasurer of State hereby is directed to correct the State Treasury records for the years nineteen hundred eight and nineteen hundred nine relating to the payment of State, county and forestry district taxes on one forty-eighth part of township number two, range nine, west from the east line of the State, in Piscataquis county, by striking out the words "Guilford Manufacturing Company" and inserting instead thereof 'S. H. Boardman.'

Chapter 183.

An Act to Amend Section Eighty-nine of Chapter Nine of the Revised Statutes, as Amended by Chapter One Hundred Eighty-four of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred Seven, Chapter Ninety-four of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred Nine, and Chapter Forty-six of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred Eleven, Relating to the Choice of Assessors of Taxes.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

Section eighty-nine of chapter nine of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter one hundred eighty-four of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred seven, chapter ninety-four of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred nine, and chapter forty-six of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred eleven, is hereby further amended by striking out the following words in the first, second and third lines, to wit: "or if so many of them refuse to accept that there are not such a number as the town voted to have," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Section 89. If any town does not choose assessors, the selectmen shall be the assessors, and each of them shall be sworn as an assessor; and each selectman and assessor shall be paid for his services, two dollars and fifty cents for every day necessary and actually employed in the service of the town. Towns having three thousand or more inhabitants may vote to pay their selectmen a compensation not exceeding five dollars a day for time actually spent in the service of the town, and any town having less than three thousand inhabitants may, by
