Chapter 184.

An Act to Repeal Section Twenty-five of Chapter One Hundred Forty-three of the Revised Statutes, Relating to the Commitment of Idle and Vicious Girls to the Maine Industrial School for Girls by Parents or Guardians.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section twenty-five of chapter one hundred forty-three of the Revised Statutes, relating to the commitment of idle and vicious girls to the Maine Industrial School for Girls by parents or guardians, is hereby repealed.

Chapter 185.

An Act Additional to Chapter Thirty-two of the Revised Statutes, as Amended by Chapter Two Hundred Six of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred Thirteen, Relating to Fishing in Fifteen Mile Stream and Its Tributaries, in the Counties of Kennebec and Waldo.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

No person shall fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in Fifteen Mile stream or in any of the tributaries to said stream, situated in the counties of Kennebec and Waldo; nor shall any person have in possession at any time any kind of fish taken in any of the above named waters. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall pay a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense; and in addition thereto one dollar for each fish taken, caught, killed or had in possession in violation of any provision of this act.
