Chapter 298.

CHAP. 298

An Act Relating to the Verification of Certificates of Organization of Corporations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

The oath to the certificate of organization of corporations, required by section eight of chapter forty-seven of the Revised Statutes, may be made outside the State before a notary public, or a commissioner appointed by the Governor to take acknowledgments of deeds in other states, by any subscriber to said certificate who was actually present in the State at the meeting for the organization of the corporation. All certificates heretofore verified outside the State before a notary public or such commissioner shall be deemed to comply with said section.

Oath to the certificate may be made outside the State.

Chapter 299.

An Act Directing the Governor and Council to Submit to Each Legislature the Approximate Amount of Money Necessary to Defray the Expenses of the Public Service.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

The Governor and Council shall submit to each Legislature not less than fifteen days after it convenes, an estimate in detail, or a general estimate in any instance where it is impracticable to give specific items, subdivided under appropriate headings, of such sums as may be deemed necessary to defray the several charges and expenses of the public service for the current and succeeding year. This estimate shall also include such sums as may be deemed necessary for charitable and benevolent institutions, new buildings or the renovation of old buildings of state institutions, and for such other purposes for which public money may be properly appropriated. It shall be accompanied by a statement showing the total valuation of taxable property in the State as compiled by the Board of State Assessors and the rate of taxation necessary to produce approximately the revenue required to meet such appropriations. It shall also show the estimated income of the State for said two years from sources other than direct taxation.

Governor and Council shall submit estimate to Legislature.
