CHAP. 344

dog fish shall be appointed by Governor and Council. —powers.

Section 2. That this said commission shall be empowered to ask Congress and other states to take this matter in hand and pass such legislation as will enable said commissioners with such other commissioners as may be appointed to successfully cooperate on this question.

Section 3. That the sum of one thousand dollars is hereby appropriated annually for the next two years to defray the expenses of said commission having this matter in charge.

Chapter 344.

An Act to Equalize the Salaries of County Commissioners.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Each county commissioner in the several counties shall receive an annual salary from the county treasury, in quarterly payments, on the first days of January, April, July and October, as follows:

Salaries of the county commissioners shall be paid by the counties as herein provided.

Androscoggin, seven hundred fifty dollars; Aroostook, eleven hundred dollars; Cumberland, twelve hundred fifty dollars; Franklin, four hundred fifty dollars; Hancock, seven hundred fifty dollars; Kennebec, ten hundred dollars; Knox, four hundred dollars; Lincoln, three hundred dollars; Oxford, six hundred dollars; Penobscot, twelve hundred dollars; Piscataquis, five hundred dollars; Sagadahoc, four hundred dollars; Somerset, six hundred fifty dollars; Waldo, four hundred dollars; Washington, six hundred fifty dollars; York, eight hundred fifty dollars.

Said salaries shall be in full for all services, expenses and travel, including the management of the jails and work shops and the sale of their products, except actual necessary cash expenses incurred outside of their respective counties for the transaction of official business; all bills for such expenses shall be approved by the clerk of courts and the county attorney of their county; excepting also, such expenses as are provided for in sections one and two of chapter one hundred seventeen of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred five as amended by chapter one hundred ninety-four of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred thirteen.

Further expenses, how provided for.

CHAP. 345 Section 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Section 3. Any official now receiving a salary greater than is herein provided shall continue to receive his present salary until the expiration of his term of office.

Chapter 345.

An Act to Amend Section Forty-seven of Chapter Thirty-two of the Revised Statutes, as Amended by Chapter Two Hundred Six of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred Thirteen. Relating to the Use of Motor Boats in Hunting Sea Birds, Duck and Water Fowl.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Section forty-seven of chapter thirty-two of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter two hundred six of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred thirteen, is hereby amended by inserting after the word "State" in the fifth line thereof the words 'or in the Kennebec river below the Gardiner and Randolph bridge, or in Eastern river, or in Merrymeeting bay, so-called, or in Bluehill bay, so-called, on the coast of Maine, in Hancock county, or in Eggemoggin reach, so-called, in said Hancock county, or in Saco bay, so-called, in Cumberland county and in York county, or in Frenchman's bay, so-called, in Hancock county,' and by adding at the end of said section the following words: 'For the purposes of this act Bluehill bay, so-called, is defined and bounded as follows: On the west by Bluehill and Brooklin to the end of Naskeag point, so-called; on the east by Long island and Tinker's island to Pond island, so-called; on the south by a direct line from the southern extremity of said Pond island to the end of Naskeag point, so-called.

For the purposes of this act Eggemoggin reach, so-called, shall be considered to be the waters extending from Little Deer Isle to Cape Rosier on the west; thence easterly to the end of Naskeag point, so-called; thence in a direct line to the eastern end of Stinson's neck, so-called, in the eastern part of Deer Isle, said waters being bounded on the north by the towns of Brooksville, Sedgwick and Brooklin and on the south by Deer Isle and Little Deer Isle.

For the purposes of this act Saco bay, so-called, shall be considered to be the waters lying within those points of land marked by Cape Elizabeth Light, in the town of Cape Elizabeth, on the east, and by Wood Island Light near the entrance to the Saco river, on the west.
