Chapter 139.

Resolve, for the Maintenance and Improvement of the State Park in Augusta.

State park, Augusta, maintenance and improvement. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated for the state park commission the sum of three thousand dollars for the year nineteen hundred and nineteen and two thousand dollars for the year nineteen hundred and twenty for the maintenance and improvement of the state park in Augusta; said money to be appropriated from moneys not otherwise appropriated and the expenditure thereof shall be under the direction of the governor and council.

Chapter 140.

Resolve, to Appropriate Money for the Purchase of History of York.

History town of York, authorizing purchase of 125 copies of by state. Resolved: That one hundred and twenty-five copies of the "History of York, the First English City on this Continent," by Edward C. Moody, be purchased by the state at a cost of \$2.00 per copy, the same to be distributed in high schools or elsewhere at the discretion of the state librarian, or library commission.

Chapter 141.

Resolve, Authorizing and Instructing the Governor and Council to Make such Alterations and Improvements of the Residence of the late James G. Blaine, Recently Given to the State by Mrs. Harriet Blaine Beale, as May be Necessary, and to Furnish it Suitably, to Serve the Purpose of an Executive Mansion, and to Acquire by Purchase such Contiguous Property as May be Needed for said Purpose.

Blaine Mansion, authorizing alterations, improvements, etc. Resolved: That the governor and council be, and hereby are, authorized and instructed to make such alterations, improvements and repairs of the residence of the late James G. Blaine, recently given to the state by Mrs. Harriet Blaine Beale, as may appear to the governor and council to be
