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## Chapter 82.

Resolve, Appropriating Money for the Repair of the Historic Block House at the Junction of the St. John River and the Fish River at Fort Kent.

**Fort Kent block house, repair of. Resolved:** That there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of two hundred dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the repair of the block house at the junction of the St. John river and the Fish river at Fort Kent, said sum to be expended under the direction of the governor and council.

Approved March 30, 1923.

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## Chapter 83.

Resolve, in Favor of Mary A. Grant for State Pension.

**Mary A. Grant, state pension. Resolved:** That the sum of twelve dollars per month be paid to Mary A. Grant, widow of Marshall A. Grant, Civil War veteran, to be paid quarterly from the fund appropriated for military pensions, beginning January first, nineteen hundred and twenty-three, and continuing during the pleasure of the legislature.

Approved March 31, 1923.

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## Chapter 84.

Resolve, in Favor of the Penobscot Tribe of Indians for Redrafting Plan Book.

**Penobscot Indians, redrafting plan book. Resolved:** That there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of three hundred dollars for the purpose of redrafting the plan book of lands of Penobscot Tribe of Indians and making additions thereto, to be expended by the governor and council.

Approved April 4, 1923.

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## Chapter 85.

Resolve, Granting a Teacher's Pension to Melville C. Smart of Gray.

**Melville C. Smart, teacher's pension. Resolved:** That a pension of one hundred fifty dollars per annum be paid to Melville C. Smart of Gray, from the teachers' pension fund until further action of the legislature.

Approved April 4, 1923.

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## Chapter 86.

Resolve, to Provide a Teacher's Pension for Fannie Marble.

**Fannie Marble, teacher's pension. Resolved:** That there be, and hereby

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is, granted to Fannie Marble a teacher's retirement pension of one hundred and fifty dollars annually as provided by law for teachers who have made teaching their life work for twenty-five years and that the state superintendent of public schools be authorized to grant said pension quarterly as is customary for teachers who are retired under provisions of the law.

Approved April 4, 1923.

## Chapter 87.

Resolve, in Favor of the State Reformatory for Men for Maintenance.

**State reformatory for men. Resolved:** That there be, and hereby is, appropriated for the maintenance of the state reformatory for men, the following sums:

**For personal services,** namely, salaries and wages of all officers and employees, except those wholly engaged in repairs or construction of buildings or equipment:

For the first fiscal period, beginning July first, nineteen hundred and twenty-three and ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and twenty-four, the sum of twenty-two thousand

For the second fiscal period, beginning July first, nineteen hundred and twenty-four and ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and twenty-five, the sum of twenty-two thousand  
dollars

22,000.00

**For maintenance,** namely, for food supplies, wearing apparel, all articles of personal clothing and materials for their fabrication and repair, all materials and supplies incident to the maintenance of the institution and inmates thereof, whether present or absent:

For the first fiscal period, beginning July first, nineteen hundred and twenty-three and ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and twenty-four, the sum of thirty-four thousand five hundred dollars

For the second fiscal period, beginning July first, nineteen hundred and twenty-four and ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and twenty-five, the sum of thirty-five thousand dol-  
lars

35,000.00

**For repairs and equipment,** namely, all materials, supplies and labor required for repairs and upkeep of grounds, build-
