## Chapter 47.

An Act Relating to the Digging of Clams in the Town of Wells.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

**Sec. 1. Digging of clams in town of Wells regulated.** It shall be unlawful for any person not a bona fide legal resident of the town of Wells in the county of York to dig clams within said town; provided that any person not a bona fide legal resident of the town of Wells but residents of the state may during one day dig not more than one half bushel of clams for home consumption within the limits of said town; and provided also that this section shall not interfere with any law relating to taking by fishermen of shell fish for bait.

**Sec. 2. Only clam hoe lawful.** It shall be unlawful for any person to dig clams within the town of Wells other than with a clam hoe.

**Sec. 3. Penalty for violations.** Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be punished for each offense by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

**Sec. 4. P. L., 1927, c. 46; relating to digging of clams in Wells, repealed.** Chapter forty-six of the public laws of nineteen hundred twenty-seven is hereby repealed.

## Chapter 48.

An Act Regulating the Taking of Shad in the Nonesuch River in Scarborough.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

**Sec. 1. Shad shall not be caught in Nonesuch river north of bridge.** No person shall fish for, take, catch or kill any shad in the waters of the Nonesuch river in the town of Scarborough, county of Cumberland, in that part of said river which is north of the bridge on the Saco road so called, at any time.

**Sec. 2. Fishing regulated; limit on number taken in nets; size of nets.** No person shall fish for, take, catch or kill any shad in the waters of said Nonesuch river below and to the south of said bridge on said Saco road except by the ordinary mode of angling with single baited hook and line or artificial flies, except that it shall be lawful for any person to take not exceeding five shad in any one day from said part of said river by means of bag nets so called, the circumference of the bow of which shall not exceed nineteen feet.
