## Chapter 164.

An Act Relating to the Incorporation of a Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., c. 62, sec. 1; P. L., 1919, c. 48; P. L., 1921, c. 101; P. L., 1923, c. 3; P. L., 1925, c. 74; relating to corporations for literary, charitable, educational and other purposes, amended. Section one of chapter sixty-two of the revised statutes, as amended by chapter forty-eight of the public laws of nineteen hundred and nineteen and by chapter one hundred and one of the public laws of nineteen hundred and twenty-one and by chapter three of the public laws of nineteen hundred and twenty-three, and as amended by chapter seventy-four of the public laws of nineteen hundred and twenty-five, is hereby amended by inserting in the tenth line thereof, after the words "American Legion Post" and before the word "as" the words 'as a Council of the Boy Scouts of America'; so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'**Sec. 1. Council of Boy Scouts of America included.** When seven or more persons desire to be incorporated as proprietors of a social, military, literary, scientific or county law library; as a Masonic lodge or chapter of any order or degree; as a Masonic association consisting of members of different orders or degrees; as a lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows; as a lodge of the Knights of Pythias; as a tribe of the Improved Order of Red Men; as a division of the Sons of Temperance; as a tent of the Rechabites; as a grange of Patrons of Husbandry; as a council of the Sovereigns of Industry; as a lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks; as a Grand Army Post; as an American Legion Post; as a council of the Boy Scouts of America; as a relief or benefit association for mutual assistance; as a monument or memorial association; as a society to promote temperance; as a village improvement society; as an association for the promotion of good municipal government; as a chamber of commerce or board of trade; as a yacht club; or for the purpose of preserving and maintaining a family homestead and the rights of descendants and of members of the family therein; or for any literary, scientific, musical, charitable, educational, social, military, agricultural, moral, religious, or benevolent purpose; they may apply in writing to any justice of the peace in the county, who may issue his warrant directed to one of said applicants, requiring him to call a meeting thereof at such time and place as the justice may appoint.'
