Sec. 2. Inconsistent acts repealed. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. Approval in referendum provided for. This act shall take effect and be in full force, when approved by a majority of the votes cast by those qualified to vote in municipal elections in said city, voting at the first annual election to be held on the ninth day of December, in the year of our lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, or at such earlier date as the city council may determine.

Sec. 4. Question on ballot. The city clerk shall reduce the subject matter of this act to the following question and cause same to be printed on the official election ballot: "Shall the act relating to the retirement of regular drivers of the fire department, upon half pay, be adopted?" and the voters shall indicate their preference by a cross within a square upon their ballots, said ballots to contain squares for answer of said question, marked "Yes" and "No" respectively.

Chapter 41.

An Act to Provide Pensions for the Regular Policemen of the City of Westbrook.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. P. & S. L., 1907, c. 257, sec. 20; relating to police department, amended; pensions provided. Section twenty of chapter two hundred and fifty-seven of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and seven, being the charter of the city of Westbrook, is hereby amended by the addition of the following provisions: "The regular policemen may be retired upon pension of half pay drawn by the person at the time of retirement, who have been honorably discharged from the police department by reason of: First: having served in the capacity of regular policemen for not less than twenty-five years, or second: having served in the capacity of regular policemen in said police department not less than twenty years and having reached the age of sixty-five years; or third: having been permanently disabled in the performance of duty. It shall be the duty of the city council of the city of Westbrook to provide for payment to the widow of any aforesaid member of its police department, who has lost his life in the performance of his duty, an annuity of not more than twenty-five

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dollars per month, so long as she remains a widow and in need of such annuity. If any such regular policeman who has lost his life in the performance of his duty leaves no widow, such annuity shall be paid to the minor child or children, or other person or persons dependent upon such regular policeman, for such period as the city council shall determine.'

Sec. 2. Inconsistent acts repealed. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Chapter 42.

An Act to Authorize the Town of South Bristol to Raise Money for the Purpose of Helping-Keep in Repair the Cemeteries in Said Town.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Authorized to raise money for care of cemeteries; how expended. The inhabitants of the town of South Bristol, a municipal corporation in the county of Lincoln, are hereby authorized to raise money, under an appropriate article in the town warrant, to help keep in good repair and condition all monuments, headstones, markers and graves in any or all of the cemeteries of said town and also to keep all bushes and grass cut and the trees and shrubs properly trimmed. The sums so raised may be expended by the said town or its servants or agents or by a committee consisting of citizens thereof, and any church organization or society interested in keeping such burying ground in proper condition and repair.
