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shall be elected and notified, their elections determined and vacancies filled in the same manner, and they shall enter upon the discharge of their duties at the same time as is provided respecting county commissioners, but they shall hold office for two years. None but a permanent resident of the county shall hold such office Only attorneys at law admitted to the general practice of law in this state, and resident in the county, shall be elected or appointed as county attorney, and removal therefrom vacates the office. Whenever the governor and council, upon complaint and due notice and hearing, shall find that a county attorney has violated any statute, or is not performing his duties faithfully and efficiently, they may remove him from office and appoint another attorney in his place for the remainder of the term for which he was elected.'

Chapter 16.

AN ACT Discontinuing Publishing Lists of Costs.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S. c. 148, § 13, repealed. Section 13 of chapter 148 of the revised statutes is hereby repealed.

Chapter 17.

AN ACT Relating to Fishing in Lake Pennesseewassee and Sand Pond.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- Sec. 1. Trout fishing in tributaries to Big Pennesseewassee. The tributaries to Big Lake Pennesseewassee are hereby opened to trout fishing under the general law.
- Sec. 2. Smelt fishing in Big Pennesseewassee and Little Pennesseewassee and tributaries. It shall be unlawful to take smelts in any manner from Big Lake Pennesseewassee and Little Lake Pennesseewassee, and their tributaries.
- Sec. 3. Ice fishing in Big Pennesseewassee. Big Lake Pennesseewassee is hereby opened to ice fishing under the general law.
- Sec. 4. Trout limit in Big and Little Pennesseewassee and Sand Pond. It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch and kill at any time in any one day more than 5 trout, from either Big Lake Pennesseewassee,

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Little Lake Pennesseewassee or Sand Pond, provided further that such catch shall not weigh more than 10 pounds.

- Sec. 5. Black bass limit in Sand Pond. It shall be unlawful for the occupants of any one boat to take, catch and kill in any one day more than 5 black bass in Sand Pond.
- Sec. 6. Penalty. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall be punished by the penalty in section 107 of chapter 38 of the revised statutes.

Chapter 18.

AN ACT Relating to the Jurisdiction of Municipal Courts in Certain Cases.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- P. L., 1931, c. 241, § 1, amended. Section 1 of chapter 241 of the laws of 1931 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 'Sec. 1. Jurisdiction. Except as hereinafter provided, judges of municipal courts within their respective jurisdictions shall have exclusive original jurisdiction over all offenses committed by children under the age of 17 fifteen years. No adjudication or judgment under the provisions of this act shall be deemed to constitute a conviction for crime, but the foregoing shall not apply to sentences under paragraph 2 of section 4 hereof. Provided, however, that for the purpose of determining the guilt of any person charged as an accessory to any offense committed by a child under the age of 17 fifteen years such offense shall be deemed to be the same as if committed by a person over 17 fifteen years of age.'

Chapter 19.

AN ACT Relating to Fishing in Upper Taylor Brook.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. L. 1925, c. 79, repealed. Chapter 79 of the public laws of 1925 is hereby repealed.
