Chapter 27.

AN ACT to Authorize the Old Town Herbert Gray School District to Refund Any of Its Bonds Falling Due in the Years 1933 and 1934.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. & S. L., 1925, c. 78, relating to Old Town Herbert Gray School District authorized to refund certain bonds. The Old Town Herbert Gray School District, a quasi-municipal corporation created by chapter 78 of the private and special laws of 1925, is hereby authorized and empowered to refund any of its serial bonds falling due during the years 1933 and 1934 for a period of not exceeding 20 years, upon such terms and conditions as the trustees of said district may determine.

Approved March 13, 1933.

Chapter 28.

AN ACT Relating to Police Pensions in the City of Portland.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. & S. L., 1927, c. 75, § 1, amended. Section 1 of chapter 75 of the private and special laws of 1927 is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 1. The city of Portland is hereby authorized to provide, by ordinance, for the retirement, upon pension not exceeding half pay, of all the members of its police force, including the chief of police, deputy chief of police, captains, lieutenants, sergeants and patrolmen, who have been honorably discharged from the police force by reason of,

First: having served on said police force not less than 25 consecutive years, or

Second: having served on the police force not less than 20 consecutive years and having reached the age of 65 years, or

Third: having been permanently disabled in the performance of duty.'

Approved March 13, 1933.

Chapter 29.

AN ACT Authorizing the Town of Bristol to Raise Money for the Purpose of Helping Keep in Repair the Cemeteries in Said Town.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:
