**Chapter 1.**

**AN ACT to Extend the Charter Granted to the Sandy River and Rangeley Lakes Railroad Company.**

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Charter of Sandy River and Rangeley Lakes Railroad Company, extended. The act of incorporation of the Sandy River and Rangeley Lakes Railroad Company, being chapter 99 of the private and special laws of 1927, is hereby extended for 2 years from the date when this law becomes effective, with the same force and effect in all respects as if said incorporation were hereby granted.

**Chapter 2.**

**AN ACT Authorizing the Adjutant-General to Grant a Permit to the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company at Camp Keyes.**

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Adjutant-general may permit telephone, etc., construction at Camp Keyes. The adjutant-general may from time to time grant a permit or permits to the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, to erect, construct, maintain and operate its lines of telephone and telegraph upon, over and beneath the premises in Augusta known as Camp Keyes, upon such terms and conditions and for such period of time as he thinks proper.
