### Chapter 124

#### AN ACT Relating to Trapping and Hunting Fur-bearing Animals.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. I. Unlawful to trap and hunt fur-bearing animals. No person shall at any time hunt or trap any fur-bearing animal on Number 3 pond located in the town of Lee and in township No. 3, range I north of the Bingham and Penobscot Purchase, nor on any stream flowing into said pond.

Sec. 2. Penalty. Whoever violates the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalties provided under section 107 of chapter 38 of the revised statutes, as revised.

### Chapter 125

### AN ACT Amending the Law Relating to the Width of Motor Vehicles.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

**R. S., c. 29, § 15, amended.** Section 15 of chapter 29 of the revised statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 15. Height and width of motor vehicles and trailers limited. No motor vehicle or trailer which, with or without load, is wider than 8 feet over all, or is over 12 feet, 6 inches high, shall be operated upon any way or bridge. No portion of any such vehicle or load, except the reflecting mirror required by this chapter, shall project beyond the side of said vehicle to make a total width greater than herein specified. Provided, however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to snowplows and equipment used exclusively for the removal of snow, or to construction equipment, the use of which is confined to the limits of highway and bridge construction projects, and provided, however, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed as limiting the width of a load of loose hay or pea vines or cornstalks.'
