Chapter 9

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Moose Pond, Little.

Fishing in Moose pond, Little, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, be and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Moose pond, Little, in Denmark, county of Oxford, to ice fishing for pickerel from the time the ice forms in the fall until it goes out in the spring.

Approved February 24, 1941

Chapter 10

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Moose Pond.

Fishing in Moose pond, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, be and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Moose pond in Denmark and Bridgton, counties of Cumberland and Oxford, to white perch fishing from April 1st to September 30th each year.

Chapter 11

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Moose Pond.

Fishing in Moose pond, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, be and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Moose pond in Denmark, Oxford county, from Walkers Bridge south to the dam, to pickerel fishing from the time the ice forms in the fall until it goes out in the spring.

Approved February 24, 1941
