Chapter 61

RESOLVE, in Favor of Howard Douglass, of Upton.

Howard Douglass; compensated. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of \$123.65 to be paid to Howard Douglass, of Upton, to compensate Mr. Douglass in full for damage to his car caused by a deer; said sum to be paid from the appropriation for the department of inland fisheries and game.

Chapter 62

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Damariscotta Lake.

Fishing in Damariscotta lake, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game, be and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation establishing a daily limit of 5 bass per person per day, not to exceed 10 pounds in all, on Damariscotta lake in the county of Lincoln, during the open season on bass on said lake.

Chapter 63

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Round Pond.

Fishing in Round pond, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Round pond in Charlotte, county of Washington, to ice fishing for pickerel, white perch, hornpout, yellow perch, eels, cusk, chubs and smelts from the time the ice forms in the fall until it goes out in the spring and for all fish (except bass) during February, March and April, and prohibiting the sale of pickerel taken therefrom; and establishing a daily bag limit of 10 fish per person per day during the legal open season.
