**CHAP. 15**

authorized and directed to add to the rule and regulation issued under chapter 58 of the resolves of 1941, the following:

' , except that the persons holding a license under section 38-A of chapter 38 of the revised statutes may catch smelts under the provisions of said section in the above waters.'

**Chapter 13**

**RESOLVE, in Favor of Lake Webb Fish and Game Association.**

Lake Webb Fish and Game Association, reimbursed. Resolved: That the sum of \$235.55 be, and hereby is, appropriated to be taken from the funds available for the use of the department of inland fisheries and game, to be paid to Lake Webb Fish and Game Association of Weld, Maine, said sum being  $\frac{1}{2}$  the cost of repairs on the screen located at Webb lake in the town of Weld.

**Chapter 14**

**RESOLVE, Relating to Ice Fishing in Mud Pond in the Town of Peru.**

Ice fishing for certain fish in Mud pond in town of Peru, permitted. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, directed and authorized to issue a rule and regulation opening Mud pond in the town of Peru to ice fishing for pickerel, hornpout, white perch, yellow perch, eels, cusk, chubs, and smelts.

**Chapter 15**

**RESOLVE, Authorizing the Treasurer of State to Reconvey to the Town of Houlton a Certain Unused Armory Site.**

Treasurer of state authorized to convey certain land. Resolved: That the treasurer of state be, and hereby is, authorized to convey to the inhabitants of the town of Houlton for the sum of \$1 the interest of the state in a certain parcel of land situated in said Houlton, viz:

The premises described in a deed from the inhabitants of the town of Houlton to the state of Maine dated October 31, 1940 and recorded in volume 486, page 484 of the Aroostook Registry of Deeds to which deed and record reference is made for a particular description.

## Chapter 16

### RESOLVE, Relating to Close Time on Lobsters in Certain Waters.

Rule and regulation 79, repealed. Resolved: That the commissioner of sea and shore fisheries be, and hereby is, directed to repeal rule and regulation 79 as published in the official rules and regulations of the department, and authorized by chapter 22 of the resolves of 1939.

## Chapter 17

### RESOLVE, in Favor of Fort McClary.

Completion of rehabilitation of Fort McClary. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of \$1000 to be expended by the superintendent of buildings for the completion of the rehabilitation of Fort McClary, including the replacing of windows and doors, and shingling the building.

## Chapter 18

### RESOLVE, Designating the Baxter State Park Road.

Baxter State Park road, designated. Resolved: That the present existing road, from Millinocket, to Greenville, by way of Mt. Katahdin, Baxter State Park, and Ripogenus Dam, is hereby named the Baxter State Park road, and it shall henceforth be so described on the highway maps of the state.
