contrary to a by-law or ordinance adopted under this authorization is a nuisance; provided it shall be the duty of the inspector of buildings to withhold permit for any of the above operations in violation of any by-law or ordinance enacted hereunder, and appeal shall lie from the decision of the inspector of buildings to the municipal officers and from said municipal officers to the superior court according to the provisions of section 33 of chapter 84; and provided further, that said municipal officers shall have the power to hear and determine appeals from the refusal of such permits and to permit exceptions to or variations from the terms of such by-law or ordinance in the class of cases or situations and in accordance with the principles, conditions, and procedure specified in such by-law or ordinance.'

AN ACT Relating to Absent Voting.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 6, § 1, amended. Section 1 of chapter 6 of the revised statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. I. Term "absentee voters" defined. An absentee voter is defined to be any person who is a duly qualified registered voter and, in respect to any primary election, duly enrolled as a member of the political party in the primary of which he proposes to vote except when he is serving a sentence in jail or in any penal institution, after conviction, in this or any other state, of a criminal offense, but who, through absence from the city or town in which he is entitled to vote, or who, through some physical incapacity not adversely affecting his soundness of mind, to which condition a physician duly admitted to practice shall have certified after examination, is unable to cast his ballot at the voting place where he is entitled to vote, at any city election, which shall include a city primary where the Australian ballot is used, at any primary election held pursuant to the provisions of sections 1, 15, 45, and 46, of chapter 4, or at any general or special state election as the term state election is defined in section 1 of chapter 5, including also elections for the choice of electors of president and vice-president of the United States, elections held in accordance with the initiative or referendum provisions of the constitution of Maine, and elections to vote upon amendments to the constitution of Maine.'
