ment therein which the court could render if in session. Any such justice may in vacation render judgment in any case heard by him in term time. Parties shall have the right of exception to such orders and judgments, and to other rulings on questions of law, as if judgment had been rendered in term time. Bills of exceptions in such cases shall be filed within 30 days from the rendition of judgment, unless the time is further extended by any justice of such court. When a judgment for the plaintiff is rendered in vacation, all pending attachments of property shall continue in force for 30 days after the next term in that county.'

Chapter 137

AN ACT Relating to Removal of Notices on Roads Closed for Repairs.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 19, § 96, amended. Section 96 of chapter 19 of the revised statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 96. Roads closed for repairs; notices. No person shall remove, injure, or tamper with any sign, lights, flares, or other signalling or safety device placed by authority of the state highway commission, or by any local official having charge of the repair and maintenance of ways and bridges; nor shall any person operate any vehicle over a way or bridge which is lawfully closed for construction or repairs, and contrary to posted notice whether the work thereon is being done by the state, county, or municipality, or by a contractor, unless permit to pass is expressly granted by some person in charge of the work.'

Chapter 138

AN ACT Relating to Premises Where Condemned Animals Are Found by Commissioner of Agriculture.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 27, § 64, amended. Section 64 of chapter 27 of the revised statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 64. Stables where condemned animals are found, to be disinfected. The commissioner shall thoroughly disinfect all stables and premises where condemned animals are found, or cause the same to be done by a competent agent in the employ of such commissioner, and the expense incurred on account of such disinfectant shall be paid $\frac{1}{2}$ ~~from the appropriation allowed for the use of the division of animal industry~~ and $\frac{1}{2}$ by the owner or person in control of such stable and premises; provided, however, that the commissioner may pay $\frac{1}{2}$ of the expense from the appropriation allowed for the use of the division of animal husbandry.'

Chapter 139

AN ACT Relating to Clerk Hire in Probation Office in Androscoggin County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 136, § 28, amended. The 3rd paragraph of section 28 of chapter 136 of the revised statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'The county of Androscoggin shall have 2 probation officers, one to be designated probation officer and one to be designated assistant probation officer; and the county commissioners for Androscoggin county shall pay the probation officer a salary of ~~\$1,800~~ \$2,400, annually, and shall pay the assistant probation officer a salary of ~~\$1,000~~ \$1,300, annually; and furthermore the probation officers for Androscoggin county shall be entitled to select a clerk or stenographer for the probation office, and the county commissioners shall appropriate the sum of ~~\$830~~ \$1,040, annually, for such clerk hire. Furthermore, the county commissioners for Androscoggin county shall provide suitable quarters in the county building for this office.'
