Private and Special Laws

this act shall take effect 90 days after the final adjournment of the legislature for all purposes and for the performance of all acts, including the calling and holding of the special elections authorized in section 18, necessary or permissible hereunder until the act be accepted in accordance with section 18 whereupon the act takes complete effect.

Sec. 21. Existing statutes not affected; rights conferred subject to provisions of law. Nothing herein contained is intended to repeal, or shall be construed as repealing, the whole or any part of any existing statute, and all the rights and duties herein mentioned shall be exercised and performed in accordance with all the applicable provisions of chapter 40 of the revised statutes of 1944, and all acts amendatory thereof or additional thereto.

Chapter 45

AN ACT Granting Additional Powers to the South Paris Village Corporation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- P. & S. L., 1866, c. 75, § 2, amended. Section 2 of chapter 75 of the private and special laws of 1866, as amended by chapter 18 of the private and special laws of 1878 and by chapter 164 of the private and special laws of 1905, is hereby further amended to read as follows:
- 'Sec. 2. May raise money for fire department and for other purposes. Said corporation is hereby invested with power at any legal meeting called for the purpose, to raise such sums of money as may be sufficient for the purchase, repair and preservation of one or more fire engines, engine houses, hose, buckets, ladders, or other apparatus for the extinguishment of fire, for the construction of reservoirs and aqueducts for the procuring of water, and for organizing and maintaining within the limits of said territory an efficient fire department; also lighting their streets, constructing sidewalks, maintaining a night watch and police force, aiding in the care, upkeep, management and improvement of public cemeteries located within its limits, and for the support and maintenance of a library within the limits of said corporation.'
