## Chapter 152

AN ACT to Extend the Charter of the Eliot Water District.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

**Extension of powers.** The rights, powers and privileges granted by chapter 101 of the private and special laws of 1941 are hereby extended for a term of 6 years from the time when the same would otherwise expire, and all acts performed under the provisions of such chapter are hereby validated and declared to be legal acts of the district.

## Chapter 153

AN ACT Relating to the Salary of the Judge of Western Somerset Municipal Court.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

P. & S. L., 1909, c. 331, § 8, amended. Section 8 of chapter 331 of the private and special laws of 1909, as amended, is hereby further amended so that the 1st sentence thereof shall read as follows:

'As compensation for his services in that capacity the judge of said court shall receive an annual salary of ~~\$2,000~~ \$2,200, payable in quarterly instalments from the treasury of the county of Somerset, on the 1st days of January, April, July and October, and in addition shall receive his necessary traveling expenses, including mileage allowance, hotel expenses, meals, etc., when holding court in another town than that in which he resides.'

## Chapter 154

AN ACT Increasing the Salary of the Judge of Biddeford Municipal Court.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

P. & S. L., 1931, c. 85, § 1, amended. Section 1 of chapter 85 of the private and special laws of 1931 is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 1. Judge of Biddeford municipal court, salary; recorder. ~~From and after the 1st day of April, 1931, the~~ The judge of the municipal court

of the city of Biddeford shall receive an annual salary of ~~sixteen hundred dollars~~ \$1,800, payable quarterly, out of the county treasury on the 1st days of July, October, January and April, which shall be in full for all his services. And in case of the death, resignation or removal from office of the judge, his recorder shall act as and shall receive the salary of the judge until the judge's successor is appointed and qualified, and shall be subject to all the provisions of law pertaining to the office.'

## Chapter 155

### AN ACT Relating to the Digging of Clams for Commercial Purposes in the Towns of Waldoboro and Bremen.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

License required to dig or take clams for commercial purposes in towns of Waldoboro and Bremen; exception; penalty. No person, except as provided in this chapter, shall dig or take any clams, for commercial purposes, in the towns of Waldoboro and Bremen in the county of Lincoln, until he has procured a municipal license therefor.

The municipal officers of their respective towns of Waldoboro and Bremen are authorized to issue such licenses to legal residents of the towns and to fix the fee therefor. Such license shall entitle the person holding such license to dig or take clams for commercial purposes in either or both towns of Waldoboro and Bremen. A resident shall be considered a person who has lived in the state 6 months and in the town 3 months.

Any person may, without such license, dig or take clams for use as food, provided that the amount of clams so taken shall not exceed  $\frac{1}{2}$  bushel per day.

Any person may, without such license, dig or take clams for use as bait in an amount not to exceed 1 bushel per day.

Whoever violates any provision of this chapter shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$10, nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.
