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CHAP. 87

RESOLVES, 1947

for the purpose of encouraging cultivation of forests, which was accepted by chapter 67 of the resolves of 1909, and modified by chapter 157 of the resolves of 1929, are hereby further modified so that the 1st paragraph of said conditions is hereby amended to read as follows:

'The time of the contest shall be made to read, once in ~~five~~ ten years and the prizes shall be one hundred and twenty-five dollars, first prize; seventy-five dollars, second prize; fifty dollars, third prize.'

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## Chapter 85

RESOLVE, Providing for an Increase in Retirement Pension for Oscar F. Williams.

Oscar F. Williams; retirement pension increased. Resolved: That the retirement pension now being paid to Oscar F. Williams of Thomaston, under the provisions of chapter 60 of the revised statutes be increased by an amount that will give him a retirement benefit of  $\frac{1}{2}$  his average final compensation.

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## Chapter 86

RESOLVE, Providing for Purchase of Land for the Bangor State Hospital.

Commissioner of institutional service authorized to purchase land. Resolved: That the commissioner of institutional service be, and hereby is, authorized to purchase for use by the Bangor State Hospital land situated in the city of Bangor and now owned by the city of Bangor.

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## Chapter 87

RESOLVE, Authorizing the State Tax Assessor to Convey Certain Interest of the State in Lands in Washington County to Viola Grass, of Lambert Lake.

State tax assessor authorized to convey certain lands. Resolved: That the state tax assessor be, and hereby is, authorized to convey to Viola Grass, of Lambert Lake, whatever interest the state has in lot in T. 1, R. 3,

## Chapter 88

**RESOLVE, Granting a Pension to Dorothy L. Springer, of Lisbon Falls.**

**Teacher's pension granted to Dorothy L. Springer. Resolved:** That a special pension be, and hereby is, granted to Dorothy L. Springer, of Lisbon Falls, comparable with that paid under the teachers' noncontributory pension law, based on 25 years of teaching service, as is now or may hereafter be provided by the legislature, to be paid quarterly from the appropriation for pensions for retired teachers. Such pension shall begin on July 1, 1947 and continue until otherwise provided by the legislature.

## Chapter 89

**RESOLVE, Relating to Certain Equipment Issued to Officers of Maine State Guard.**

Whereas, when the Maine National Guard by order of the President of the United States was inducted into federal service as part of the Armed Forces of the country, the state of Maine was left without any defensive force; and

Whereas, by act of Congress in 1940 and by act of the Maine legislature in 1941, authority was granted to raise a Maine State Guard; and

Whereas, as a result of this legislative action and the efforts of the adjutant general, the Maine State Guard was formally organized and equipped by the state; and

Whereas, the federal government through Army Regulations 850-250 liberalized its policy and authorized the War Department to issue certain articles of equipment to the Maine State Guard; and

Whereas, this equipment was issued to the state and subsequently to the commanders of the various Maine State Guard organizations who became personally responsible for its care and preservation; and
