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school purposes, erecting, enlarging, repairing, equipping and maintaining on said property, elementary and high schools, with right to lease or let said property to said city and to receive, accept and hold gifts, grants or devises of property real, personal or mixed to be used for school and related athletic and recreational purposes and to sell such property it may have acquired all for the benefit of the inhabitants of said city.'

Sec. 2. P. & S. L., 1947, c. 96, § 4, amended. The 1st sentence of section 4 of chapter 96 of the private and special laws of 1947 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"To procure funds for the purpose of this act and such other expense as may be necessary to the carrying out of said purposes, the said district is hereby authorized, from time to time, to borrow money and to issue its bonds and notes therefor, but shall not incur a total indebtedness exceeding the sum of \$300,000 \$325,000."

#### Chapter 17

#### AN ACT Relating to the Water Supply of Boothbay Harbor.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. & S. L., 1895, c. 56, § 7, amended. Section 7 of chapter 56 of the private and special laws of 1895, as amended, is hereby repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

'Sec. 7. Board of water commissioners; duties; compensation; town manager, powers and duties. Said town is hereby authorized to elect by ballot at its annual meeting in March of each year, a board of water commissioners, consisting of 3 persons, to serve for the term of 1 year or until their successors are elected and qualified. Said commissioners are authorized to fix the water rates and determine the conditions and the manner of the water supply, and shall have the general control and management of the water system owned by the town. They shall receive such compensation for their services as may be fixed by the town. Whenever said town shall vote to employ a town manager, but not in union with one or more other towns, said town manager shall be the administrative head of the water system and responsible to the water commissioners. His powers and duties in connection therewith shall be the same as in the management of the municipal affairs of the town so far as applicable.'
