Chapter 93

RESOLVE, in Favor of Frank F. McGinley of Eddington.

Frank F. McGinley; disability retirement allowance granted. Resolved: That upon the application of Frank F. McGinley of Eddington a disability retirement allowance shall be granted, based on the service of Mr. McGinley as a teacher for 22 years in the state; and be it further

Resolved: That such disability retirement allowance be granted notwithstanding the provisions of subsection I of section 7 of chapter 60 of the revised statutes.

Effective August 6, 1949

Chapter 94

RESOLVE, in Favor of Ralph L. Hunt of Thomaston.

Ralph L. Hunt; to be given credit. Resolved: That Ralph L. Hunt of Thomaston be given credit for 12 full years of teaching service rendered in Hebron Academy, to be applied toward meeting requirements for a retirement benefit under the provisions of chapter 60 of the revised statutes.

Effective August 6, 1949

Chapter 95

RESOLVE, in Favor of Milton A. Philbrook, of Westbrook.

Milton A. Philbrook; credit for teaching service. Resolved: That Milton A. Philbrook, of Westbrook, be given credit for 30 months of teaching service rendered in the United States Navigation School (Rockland), to be applied toward meeting requirements for a retirement benefit under the provisions of chapter 60 of the revised statutes as amended.

Effective August 6, 1949
