#### Chapter 165

AN ACT Relating to Membership of the Emergency Municipal Finance Board.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 90, § I, amended. The 1st sentence of section I of chapter 90 of the revised statutes, as amended by chapter 26 of the public laws of 1947, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

'The board of emergency municipal finance, as heretofore established, and hereinafter designated in this chapter as the "board," shall be composed of the 3 persons who legally hold the offices of attorney general commissioner of finance, treasurer of state and state tax assessor.'

### Chapter 166

AN ACT Relating to Wholesale Lobster Dealer's License.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 34, § 114, amended. The 2nd paragraph of section 114 of chapter 34 of the revised statutes, as revised, is hereby amended to read as follows:

'The fee for a license, designated as a wholesale lobster dealer's license, shall be \$35 and shall entitle the holder to buy, sell, serve and transport fresh fish, shellfish, lobsters and crabs in wholesale and retail trade within the state and to ship the same within and outside the state, with the exception of the provisions covering soft-shelled clams as set forth in section 89. Provided that in addition to such license a shellfish certificate issued by the commissioner of agriculture, as provided for in section 89, shall be required for shipment beyond the limits of the state of any clams, quahogs or mussels, either in the shell or shucked, and provided further, that by virtue of
