Sec. 2. R. S., c. 33, § 84-B, repealed. Section 84-B of chapter 33 of the revised statutes, as revised, is hereby repealed.

Chapter 315

AN ACT Relating to Salary of Judge of Probate of York County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 140, § 3, amended. That part of section 3 of chapter 140 of the revised statutes, as amended, which relates to the salary of the judge of probate of York county, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

'York, ~~\$4,500~~ \$4,750.'

Chapter 316

AN ACT Relating to Power of Private Vocational Schools to Hold Property.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 50, § 5, amended. The last sentence of section 5 of chapter 50 of the revised statutes, as amended by chapter 197 of the public laws of 1949, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

'Provided, however, that any corporation organized under the provisions of this chapter for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a hospital, a free public library or a school or academy accredited by the department of education and conducted on a non-profit basis, or a laboratory exclusively engaged in research for the benefit of mankind, or a private vocational school conducted on a non-profit basis may receive and hold real and personal estate, to any amount, which may from time to time be given, granted, bequeathed or devised to it, and accepted by the corporation for the uses and purposes of said hospital, free public library, school or academy or laboratory; provided always, that both the principal and income thereof shall be appropriated according to the terms of the donation, devise or bequest.'
