the purpose not later than 8 months after the approval of this act. Such special election shall be called, advertised and conducted according to law relating to municipal elections; provided, however, that the board of registration in the town of Waldo shall not be required to prepare for posting nor the town clerk to post a new list of voters, and for the purposes of registration of voters, said board shall be in session I hour preceding such election. The town clerk shall reduce the subject matter of this act to the following question: "Shall the act to Incorporate the Town of Waldo School District be accepted?" and the voters shall indicate by ballot the words "Yes" or "No" their opinion of the same. This act shall take effect for all the purposes hereof immediately upon its acceptance by a majority of the legal voters voting at said meeting; provided that the total number of votes cast for and against the acceptance of this act at said meeting equals or exceeds 20% of the total vote for all candidates for governor in said town at the next previous gubernatorial election. The result in said district shall be declared by the municipal officers of the town of Waldo and due certificate thereof filed by the town clerk with the secretary of state.

Chapter 17

AN ACT Relating to Review and Alteration of Ward Lines in the City of Lewiston.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. & S. L., 1939, c. 8, Art. XVI, § 10, amended. Section 10 of article XVI of chapter 8 of the private and special laws of 1939 is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 10. Review and alteration of ward lines. It shall be the duty of the city council each 10th year commencing with the eensus year 1950 1951 to review, and if needful to alter, the ward lines in such manner as to preserve as nearly as may be an equal number of voters in each ward.'
