Chapter 45

RESOLVE, in Favor of Forest Lake Improvement Association.

Forest Lake Improvement Association; authorized to build dam and fish screen. Resolved: That the Forest Lake Improvement Association be, and hereby is, given the right to build, own, maintain, acquire, repair and replace a dam or dams in the waters of Forest lake, situated in the towns of Gray, Windham and Cumberland; and be it further

Resolved: That the said Forest Lake Improvement Association also be given the right to maintain, build, repair and replace a fish screen or screens in said Forest lake.

Chapter 46

RESOLVE, Opening Certain Ponds in Oxford County to Ice Fishing.

Certain ponds in Oxford county; opened to ice fishing. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Moose pond, Mill pond and Noah Eastman pond, all in the town of Lovell, Oxford county, to ice fishing.

Effective August 20, 1951

Chapter 47

RESOLVE, Closing Bartlett Brook, Oxford County, to Dipping of Smelts.

Bartlett brook; closed to dipping of smelts. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation closing Bartlett brook in the town of Stoneham, Oxford county, to the dipping of smelts.
