RESOLVES, 1951

### Chapter 48

RESOLVE, Opening Virginia Lake, Oxford County, to Ice Fishing for White Perch.

Virginia lake; opened to ice fishing for white perch. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Virginia lake in the town of Stoneham, Oxford county, to ice fishing for white perch.

Effective August 20, 1951

### Chapter 49

RESOLVE, Closing Keewaydin Lake, Oxford County, to Ice Fishing for Salmon and Trout.

Keewaydin lake; closed to ice fishing for salmon and trout. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation prohibiting the taking of salmon and trout through the ice from Keewaydin lake in the town of Stoneham, Oxford county.

Effective August 20, 1951

### Chapter 50

RESOLVE, Relating to Catching of White Perch in Pushaw Lakes, Penobscot County.

White perch; extending closed season. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation extending the closed season on white perch in both big and little Pushaw lakes or ponds, and the outlet and tributaries thereof, in the towns of Corinth, Hudson, Glenburn, Orono and Old Town, in the county of Penobscot, from October 1st until the 20th day of the following June, inclusive, of each year.
