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## Chapter 70

### RESOLVE, Closing Certain Waters in Hancock County to Taking of Salt Water Smelts.

Salt water smelts; certain waters closed to taking of. Resolved: That the commissioner of sea and shore fisheries be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation closing all brooks and rivers to the taking of salt water smelts, in any manner, in the towns of Brooklin, Bluehill, Surry, Ellsworth, Trenton, Lamoine, Sullivan and Gouldsboro during the months of March, April and May of each year; except that it shall be legal to take smelts by hand or hand dip nets, in the amount of 4 quarts to a person, in the following designated brooks and rivers during the months above named, on any one tide:

Flanders stream, in the town of Sullivan,

Union river, in the city of Ellsworth, all in the county of Hancock.

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## Chapter 71

### RESOLVE, for the Laying of the County Taxes for Cumberland County for the Years Nineteen Hundred Fifty-one and Nineteen Hundred Fifty-two.

**Emergency preamble.** Whereas, Cumberland county has certain expenses and liabilities which must be met as they become due; and

Whereas, Cumberland county has no source of revenue except the taxes hereinafter mentioned; and

Whereas, it is necessary that the taxes for the year 1951 hereinafter mentioned be immediately assessed in order to provide the required revenue; and

Whereas, Chapter 33 of the Resolves of 1951 is in error as to the amounts to be raised by the county of Cumberland; and

Whereas, it is vitally necessary that such error be corrected; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it
