PROVISION REPEALED THAT BELLS BE ATTACHED TO HORSES 157 PUBLIC LAWS, 1953 CHAP. 175

Whereas, the people of Maine recognize that state employment preference should be extended to all veterans; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the legislature these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 59, § 12-A, amended. Section 12-A of chapter 59 of the revised statutes, as enacted by chapter 360 of the public laws of 1945, and as amended, is hereby further amended by adding after subsection V of the fourth paragraph thereof, a new subsection to be numbered VI, to read as follows:

'VI. Korean Campaign, June 25, 1950 and the date on which hostilities are declared to have ended, either by proclamation of the president or by joint resolution of congress.'

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 175

AN ACT Repealing the Provision that Bells Shall Be Attached to Foremost Horses on Vehicles Driven on Snow.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 19, § 76, repealed. Section 76 of chapter 19 of the revised statutes is hereby repealed, as follows:

'See. 76. Bells shall be attached to horse or animal drawn wehicles when snow is on ground. One or more bells shall be either attached to one of the foremost horses drawing wehicles without wheels on snow, or attached to the shafts of the wehicle.'
