## Chapter 245

### AN ACT Relating to Accident Insurance for Boxers.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., c. 78, § 8-A, additional. Chapter 78 of the revised statutes is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 8-A, to read as follows:

'Sec. 8-A. Accident insurance for boxers. The commission shall have the authority, in its discretion, to make and promulgate rules requiring coverage by accident insurance in the event of injury or death for persons competing in properly licensed boxing or sparring matches or exhibitions, as defined in this chapter. Such insurance, if required, shall comply with standards prescribed by the insurance commissioner.'

## Chapter 246

### AN ACT Relating to Throwing Substances on Highways Likely to Cause Fires.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., c. 85, § 34-A, additional. Chapter 85 of the revised statutes is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 34-A, to read as follows:

'Sec. 34-A. Throwing substances on highways; penalty. It shall be unlawful to drop or throw from any vehicle upon a public or private way a lighted cigarette, cigar, match or live ashes or any substance or thing in and of itself likely to cause a fire.

Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10, nor more than \$50.'
