Sec. 25. Application of payments. Any order of support issued by a court of this state when acting as a responding state shall not supersede any previous order of support issued in a divorce or separate maintenance action, but the amounts for a particular period paid pursuant to either order shall be credited against amounts accruing or accrued for the same period under both.

Sec. 26. Effect of participation in proceeding. Participation in any proceedings under this chapter shall not confer upon any court jurisdiction of any of the parties thereto in any other proceeding.'

Chapter 249

AN ACT Relating to Pauper Settlement of Parents of Children Receiving Aid to Dependent Children.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 82, § 9, amended. The last sentence of section 9 of chapter 82 of the revised statutes, as enacted by chapter 127 of the public laws of 1949, is hereby amended to read as follows:

'During the period that a dependent child is receiving aid under the pertinent provisions of chapter 22 of the revised statutes, such dependent child and the parent from whom such child derives his settlement shall not acquire or lose a settlement.'

Chapter 250

AN ACT Relating to Disposition of Liquor Seized or Forfeited.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 57, § 63, sub-§ IV, additional. Section 63 of chapter 57 of the revised statutes is hereby amended by adding thereto a new subsection to be numbered IV, to read as follows:

'IV. The commission may authorize hospitals and state institutions to import for medicinal purposes only liquor made available to them from stocks of liquor seized by the federal government.'
