CHAP. 315

Sec. 3. Resolves, 1923, c. 51, repealed. Chapter 51 of the resolves of 1923 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. P. L., 1925, c. 134, repealed. Chapter 134 of the public laws of 1925 is hereby repealed.

Chapter 314

AN ACT Relating to Revolving Fund for Administration of Social Security for Political Subdivisions of State.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 60-A, § 7, amended. Section 7 of chapter 60-A of the revised statutes, as enacted by section 1 of chapter 395 of the public laws of 1951, is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 7. Cost of administration. Any cost of administering the provisions of this chapter may be prorated among the political subdivisions joining this plan. A revolving fund of \$10,000 is hereby appropriated from the general fund unappropriated surplus of the state from which costs of administration shall be paid and to which shall be credited the amounts billed to and received from the political subdivisions in the plan.'

Chapter 315

AN ACT Relating to Eating and Lodging Places.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 22, § 154, amended. The last sentence of section 154 of chapter 22 of the revised statutes, as enacted by chapter 331 of the public laws of 1947, is hereby repealed.
