Chapter 202

AN ACT Relating to Persons to Whom Liquor Licenses May Not Be Issued.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 61, § 29, amended. Section 29 of chapter 61 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by section 2 of chapter 71 of the public laws of 1955, is hereby further amended by inserting before the last sentence thereof, a new sentence, as follows:

'No person whose license for sale of liquor expires pending an appeal from conviction of a violation of law forbidding sale of intoxicating liquor on Sunday, by himself or his clerk, servant or agent, on his licensed premises, shall, after subsequent final conviction of himself, clerk, servant or agent be eligible for a liquor license for a period not exceeding 5 years from the date of such final conviction.'

Chapter 203

AN ACT to Revise the Laws Relating to Registration of Accountants.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 80, § 1, amended. The last sentence of the 1st paragraph of section 1 of chapter 80 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Two All members of said Board shall be skilled in the art of accounting and shall have been actively engaged in the profession of a public accountant; they shall be holders of certificates issued under the provisions of this chapter; the other member shall be a practicing attorney in good standing in the courts of this state.'

Sec. 2. R. S., c. 80, § 4, amended. The last sentence of section 4 of chapter 80 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'To those who have shown the required proficiency in the theory of accounts, practical accounting, auditing, business systems and commercial law and such other subjects as it deems necessary and whom it believes to be of such character and fitness as to qualify them to act as public accountants, it shall issue a certificate over the signatures of the members of the Board and under its seal that the applicant is entitled to practice as a certified public accountant in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.'
