Chapter 57

RESOLVE, Prohibiting Taking of Smelts from Auburn Lake and Little Wilson Pond, Androscoggin County.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, the following legislation is necessary in the best interests of conservation to protect the taking of smelts; and

Whereas, resolves, unless passed as emergencies, do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature; and

Whereas, this legislation is necessary for conservation reasons in the spring of 1957; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Auburn lake and Little Wilson pond; prohibiting taking of smelts. Resolved: That the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation prohibiting the taking of smelts by any method from Auburn lake and Little Wilson pond and their tributaries, Androscoggin county.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

Effective March 22, 1957

Chapter 58

RESOLVE, Closing Waters near Grand Lake Stream Dam to Fishing.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves passed by the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, it is immediately necessary to close the waters near Grand Lake Stream dam to fishing; and

Whereas, such legislation is in the best interest of conserving our natural resources; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine, and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Grand Lake Stream Dam; closed to fishing. Resolved: That the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation closing all waters within 150 feet of the Grand Lake Stream Dam to fishing.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 59

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Howard Pond, Oxford County.

Howard pond; regulating fishing. Resolved: That the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Howard pond, Oxford county, to fishing with a daily limit of 5 trout or salmon in the aggregate, with the inlet brook at Morrison's Lodge closed from 50 feet below the footbridge at red stakes for $\frac{1}{2}$ mile upstream. The use or possession of live fish as bait is prohibited.

Effective August 28, 1957

Chapter 60

RESOLVE, Opening Wentworth Pond, Somerset County to Ice Fishing.

Wentworth pond; open to ice fishing. Resolved: That the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation opening Wentworth pond in Solon and Athens, Somerset county, to ice fishing under the general laws from ice in to March 31st for all fish except bass, salmon, trout and togue.

Effective August 28, 1957

Chapter 61

RESOLVE, for Laying of the County Taxes for the Years Nineteen Hundred Fifty-seven and Nineteen Hundred Fifty-eight.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, the several counties hereinafter named; have certain expenses and liabilities which must be met as they become due; and

Whereas, the several counties have no source of revenue except the taxes hereinafter mentioned; and

Whereas, it is necessary that the taxes for the year 1957 hereinafter mentioned be immediately assessed, in order to provide the required revenue for the several counties; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it
