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## Chapter 26

### AN ACT Regulating Fishing for White Perch in Certain Counties.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., c. 37, § 45, amended. The 4th paragraph of section 45 of chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes, as revised, is repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

'No person shall take, kill or have in possession more than 25 white perch taken from the waters of Kennebec and Somerset Counties and Boyd Lake in Piscataquis County except as provided by rules and regulations of the department under section 9.'

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## Chapter 27

### AN ACT Prohibiting the Use of Power Boats on Quimby Pond, Rangeley.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., c. 37, § 67, amended. Section 67 of chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes, as revised, is amended by adding a new paragraph to read as follows:

'No person shall operate any boat or canoe propelled by motor on Quimby Pond in the Town of Rangeley, Franklin County.'

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## Chapter 28

### AN ACT Providing for Reciprocity Between States Relative to Funeral Directors and Embalmers.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., c. 25, § 196, additional. Section 196 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new paragraph to read as follows:

'The Board of Examiners of Funeral Directors and Embalmers may enter into reciprocal agreements with corresponding boards of other states for the purpose of allowing licensed funeral directors or embalmers to perform their licensed functions in this or other states under such terms and conditions as the boards may prescribe.'
