Chapter 128

AN ACT Repealing Charter of Pittsfield Water Company and Transferring Assets to the Town of Pittsfield.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, certain construction must be undertaken to provide adequate water supply to the citizens of the Town of Pittsfield; and

Whereas, construction must be commenced under favorable weather conditions; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. Assets, etc. to Town of Pittsfield. All real and personal property, together with all accounts receivable, choses in action, and all other rights and benefits that may be either due or payable to, or would accrue to, or for the benefit of the Pittsfield Water Company shall be and become the property of the Town of Pittsfield; said town being vested with all rights and powers of holding, disposing of or enforcing such rights so acquired.

Sec. 2. Eminent domain. The Town of Pittsfield is authorized to exercise the powers of eminent domain as set forth in the Revised Statutes of 1954, chapter 90-B, section 6, for all purposes relating to public water supply.

Sec. 3. P. & S. L., 1891, c. 230, repealed. Chapter 230 of the private and special laws of 1891 is repealed.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 129

AN ACT Providing for a New Charter for the City of Waterville.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

ARTICLE I

Grant of Powers to the City

Sec. 1. Incorporation. The inhabitants of the City of Waterville in the County of Kennebec, within the corporate limits as now established in the manner provided by law, shall continue to be a municipal body politic and corporate in perpetuity, under the name of the City of Waterville.
