CHAPTER 614

AN ACT Relating to Per Diem Allowances and Expenses for Members of the State Board of Barbers and State Board of Hairdressers.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the following legislation is vitally necessary to enable the board members to carry out the duties conferred upon them by statutes; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., T. 32, § 351, amended. The last paragraph of section 351 of Title 32 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by section 1 of chapter 277 of the public laws of 1971, is repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

The members of the board shall each receive as compensation for their services \$35 per day and not to exceed 5 calendar days of out-of-state travel in any one year for the time actually spent and their necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties, not to exceed \$600 per calendar year per diem, plus actual expenses.

Sec. 2. R. S., T. 32, § 1601, amended. The last paragraph of section 1601 of Title 32 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by section 2 of chapter 277 of the public laws of 1971, is repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

The members of the board shall each receive as compensation for their services \$35 per day and not to exceed 5 calendar days of out-of-state travel in any one year for the time actually spent and their necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties, not to exceed \$600 per calendar year per diem, plus actual expenses.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.
