CHAPTER 13

AN ACT Prohibiting Swimming or Bathing in Upper and Lower Hadlock Ponds, Hancock County.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, this would allow swimming in Upper and Lower Hadlock Ponds, Hancock County, during the summer months; and

Whereas, continued swimming could create a health hazard to the town whose drinking water is supplied by this lake; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Upper and Lower Hadlock Ponds; swimming or bathing prohibited. No person shall swim or bathe in Upper Hadlock Pond and Lower Hadlock Pond, Town of Mount Desert, Hancock County.
