§2460. Surrendering certificates of title

Any recycler or scrap processor who dismantles, destroys, scraps or processes a vehicle shall mail or deliver the certificate of title or certificate of salvage to the Secretary of State for cancellation. A certificate of title or registration to the vehicle shall not again be issued.

§2461. Maintenance of identification numbers

No recycler or scrap processor may possess or exercise control over a vehicle or component part thereof that has had the public vehicle identification number removed. It is not a defense to this section that the recycler or scrap processor did not know that the public identification number had been removed.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

Effective June 17, 1983.

CHAPTER 477

H.P. 1345 - L.D. 1784

AN ACT Making Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government and Changing Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1984, and June 30, 1985.

§4. Salary of justices; expenses; clerical assistance

Each Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court shall receive an annual salary of \$36,637 until June 30, 1981, and an annual salary of \$38,468 until June 30, 1982, and an annual salary of \$40,392 thereafter, and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court shall receive an annual salary of \$38,354 until June 30, 1981, and an annual salary of \$40,272 until June 30, 1982, and an annual salary of \$42,286 thereafter. Each Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court shall receive an annual salary of \$44,431 and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court shall receive an annual salary of \$46,514. Each justice shall be reimbursed by the State for his expenses actually and

reasonably incurred in attending meetings and the sessions of the Law Court, appointed by the Chief Justice under section 53, upon presentation to the State Controller of a detailed statement of such expenses. When any justice of said court holds nisi prius terms of the Superior Court in any town other than the town in which he resides, or when hearing of any court matter is had before a Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court or the Superior Court other than one residing in the town where said hearing is had, such justice shall be reimbursed by the State for his expenses actually and reasonably incurred in holding such terms or in attending said hearing, upon presentation to the State Controller of a detailed statement of such expenses. Each justice of said court shall be reimbursed by the State for expenses actually and reasonably incurred by him for clerical assistance, postage, stationery, express and telephone tolls, and any other reasonably necessary expenses, upon presentation to the State Controller of an itemized statement of such expenses. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court or his designee may prescribe regulations for the submission of such itemized statements through his office and for the advance approval by him of such other reasonably necessary expenses.

Sec. 2. 4 MRSA §102, as amended by PL 1981, c. 486, §2, is further amended to read:

§102. Salary; expenses

Each Justice of the Superior Court shall receive an annual salary of \$36,064 until June 30, 1981, and an annual salary of \$37,868 until June 30, 1982, and an annual salary of \$39,760 thereafter. Each Justice of the Superior Court shall receive an annual salary of \$43,736. Section 4, relating to reimbursement of Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court for expenses incurred by them, shall apply to Justices of the Superior Court, including reimbursement for expenses incurred in employing clerical assistance, but the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court or his designee may specify by order a maximum amount to be expended by any justice for such clerical assistance.

Sec. 3. 4 MRSA §157, first ¶, as amended by PL 1981, c. 705, Pt. F, §1, is further amended to read:

The Governor, subject to review by the joint standing committee on of the Legislature having jurisdiction over judiciary and to confirmation by the Legislature, shall appoint to the District Court 6 judges at large and 15 judges. At least one judge shall be appointed in each district who shall be a resident thereof, except that in District 3 there

shall be 2 judges appointed who shall be residents thereof and except that in District 9 there shall be 2 judges appointed who shall be residents thereof. Each shall have a term of office of 7 years. Each judge shall receive an annual salary of \$33,202 until June 30, 1981, and an annual salary of \$34,862 until June 30, 1982, and an annual salary of \$38,260 thereafter, and the Chief Judge shall receive an annual salary of \$34,347 until June 30, 1981, and an annual salary of \$36,064 until June 30, 1982, and an annual salary of \$39,260 thereafter. Each judge shall receive an annual salary of \$42,086 and the Chief Judge shall receive an annual salary of \$43,186. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court shall designate one of the judges as Chief Judge. Each judge shall be reimbursed for his expenses actually and reasonably incurred by him in performing his duties, upon presentation to the State Controller of a detailed statement of such expenses approved by the Chief Judge. The Chief Judge, with the advice and consent of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, shall designate one of the District Court Judges as Deputy Chief Judge. The Deputy Chief Judge shall receive compensation of \$500 annually in addition to his annual salary as District Court Judge.

§3761. Emergency assistance

The department, at the discretion of the commissioner, may establish and operate a program of emergency assistance to needy families with children within the United States Social Security Act, Title IV-A, Section 406(e), and any amendments and additions thereto. The department shall not expend more than \$500,000 of state general assistance funds for the purposes of covering the cost of the program.

This program shall provide benefits to needy families with children in emergency situations in which the family is deprived of the basic necessities essential to their support, including, but not limited to, utility terminations, lack of adequate shelter, fire and other natural disasters. The program shall not be used to supplant local responsibility for operating or funding a general assistance program.

The department may establish eligibility guidelines and limits on services covered under this program and shall report to the Second Regular Session of the 111th Legislature as to the progress made in the implementation of an emergency assistance program.

Sec. 2. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this subpart.

Any balance of any appropriation or subdivision of an appropriation made by the Legislature for any state department or agency, which at any time may not be required for the purpose named in such appropriations or subdivision, may be transferred at any time prior to the closing of the books to any other appropriation or subdivision of an appropriation made by the Legislature for the use of the same department or agency for the same fiscal year subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs. Financial orders describing such transfers shall be submitted by the Bureau of the Budget to the Legislative Finance Office 30 days before the transfer is to be implemented. H. Compile, analyze and maintain information useful to the development of industry in the State concerning resources, sites, space, equipment, adequate housing, contracts, materials, transportation, markets, labor supply, population trends and other economic considerations. The State Planning Office shall study problems peculiar to the industry and economy of Maine with a view toward the broader utilization of our natural resources and the development of new and improved products and techniques, which studies shall be advanced by coordination of research with existing private and governmental agencies and educational institutions, and may be advanced by contractual relations with persons or organizations equipped to conduct the needed research. The State Development Office shall maintain a close liaison with and make recommendations and reports in cooperation with the Maine Guarantee Authority, the Maine Geological Survey and the State of Maine Publicity Bureau Maine Vacation-travel Commission.

Sec. 3. 5 MRSA §7002, sub-§2, ¶F, as enacted by PL 1975, c. 481, §3, is amended to read:

F. The director shall implement a program designed to promote tourism and to attract tourists to the State, expand existing tourist activities within the State and help existing tourism-related businesses to attract tourists for their facilities. §7004. Tourism promotion and information services

1. Division of Tourism. There is established, to carry out the purposes of this section, a Division of Tourism, called the "division," within the State Development Office, which shall be directly responsible to the Director of the State Development Office.

2. Director. The director and staff of the Division of Tourism shall be appointed by the Director of the State Development Office and shall serve at his pleasure. The director and staff of the Division of Tourism shall be paid a salary fixed by the Director of the State Development Office.

3. Powers and duties. The division shall:

A. Conduct travel product planning and research to determine market demand, prepare marketing, promotion and advertising strategies, prepare a travel product development plan, determine the feasibility of travel facility development proposals, develop and implement a comprehensive travel product information system and evaluate the impact of travel product programs and grants;

B. Implement advertising and promotion programs to market this state's travel product;

C. Print, or cause to have printed, alone or in cooperation with other travel promotion agencies and groups, booklets, brochures, pamphlets and other materials as required to fulfill requests for information on Maine's travel product;

D. Encourage the development of travel product

facilities and activities by locating potential developers, providing market and feasibility analysis, assisting developers in complying with public rules and laws and providing technical assistance to location decision making, including site selection, financing and utilities;

E. Review and comment upon the policies and programs of state agencies which directly affect the achievement of the duties and responsibilities of the division;

F. Provide basic support and discretionary matching grants to local, regional and statewide nonprofit agencies which directly affect the achievement of the duties and responsibilities of the division;

G. Staff or cause to be staffed any information center constructed, owned, leased, acquired or operated by the State;

H. Employ or engage such outside technical or professional consultants or organizations as may be necessary or appropriate to assist the division in carrying out its functions;

I. Accept such fees as the Director of the State Development Office may designate for the preparation and distribution of books, booklets, brochures, pamphlets, films, photos, maps, exhibits, mailing lists, all like materials and media advertising. There is established within the division a revolving fund for the use of the division to help offset the preparation and distribution costs of these materials. The division shall retain, without charge, an appropriate number of each publication for complimentary distribution. Income from the sale of publications and other materials that were charged to the revolving fund shall be credited to the revolving fund to be used as a continuing carrying account to carry out the purposes of the revolving fund;

J. Subject to the approval of the Director of the State Development Office, adopt, amend and repeal rules to carry out the purposes of this subsection and section 7006; and

K. Undertake such other activities as the Director of the State Development Office considers appropriate and necessary to insure the successful implementation of this section.

§7005. Maine Vacation-travel Commission

1. Maine Vacation-travel Commission. The Maine Vacation-travel Commission is created to assist, advise, recommend and guide the Division of Tourism's operation. It shall consist of 9 members of major tourism trade associations and 8 public members who shall represent their respective regions and who are experienced in the field or who have demonstrated a concern for the travel industry. The terms of the members shall be 4 years each, except for the members first appointed, 4 shall be appointed for a term of 4 years, 4 for 3 years, 4 for 2 years and 5 for one year. The members shall be appointed by the Governor, who shall fill any vacancies in the appointed membership for the unexpired term. The commissioner or director, or his designee, of the following state departments or offices shall serve as ex officio, nonvoting members of the commission: State Development Office; State Planning Office; Department of Conservation; Department of Transportation; Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; Department of Educational and Cultural Services; Bureau of Public Improvements and Canadian Affairs Coordinator. A chairman and vice-chairman shall be elected annually from the appointed membership.

2. Powers and duties. The commission shall:

A. Recommend rules for the implementation of section 7006 and make recommendations on the award of matching funds to the Director of the State Development Office;

B. Recommend policy guidelines on marketing, promotion and advertising strategies to the Division of Tourism;

C. Conduct public hearings as necessary to obtain input concerning tourism policy development from a broad cross section of travel interests;

D. Assist the Division of Tourism in providing technical assistance to the travel industry and in planning and conducting periodic tourism conferences;

E. Prepare a report for annual submission to the Governor and the Legislature relative to the programs, policies and accomplishments of the Maine Vacation-travel Commission; and

F. Assist the Division of Tourism in such other areas as the Director of the State Development

Office considers appropriate and necessary to insure the successful implementation of this section.

3. Compensation. Commissioners shall serve without pay, but shall be entitled to reimbursement for normal expenses incurred for official exercise of duties subject to guidelines adopted by the Director of the State Development Office in accordance with travel rules adopted by the State.

§7006. Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program

1. Statement of purpose. There is established a Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program to serve the following purposes:

A. To allow the State to provide part of the funds necessary for public and private nonprofit travel promotion organizations to conduct promotion programs;

B. To strengthen the state image by coordinating the promotional efforts of the private sector and the Division of Tourism of the State Development Office.

2. Allocation of funds. Within the limits of available funding, for every dollar raised by the private sector for travel promotion under the provisions of this section, the State shall provide one dollar in matching funds. No grant may exceed the amount raised by the organization and applied to its proposed program. It is not the intent of this section to reduce any organization's financial participation in any on-going project, but rather to increase them or develop new programs. The grant program shall be geared to specific promotional efforts and costs and is not intended to match any administrative costs, including any form of personal services.

3. Eligible organizations. Matching funds shall be made available to those nonprofit travel promotion organizations which best meet the purposes of this section. No such organization may disburse state matching funds to a private, for profit, business for the purpose of promoting its goods, services, functions or activities.

4. Administration. The State Development Office, through the Division of Tourism shall administer the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program with such flexibility as to bring about the most effective and economical travel promotion program possible. Applications from all regions of the State shall be

equally considered. The Maine Vacation-travel Commission shall recommend rules and procedures necessary and appropriate to the proper operation of the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program. These rules shall establish eligibility requirements, allocation formulas, application procedures and criteria subject to the final approval of the Director of the State Development Office. The Maine Vacation-travel Commission shall establish a schedule for review of grant applications and make timely recommendations of grant awards to the Division of Tourism. Grants recommended by the commission to the division must be approved by the Director of the State Development Office prior to any disbursement of funds.

5. Bookkeeping systems. The State Development Office and all tourist promotion organizations qualifying for matching funds under this section shall keep accurate records of any applications, transactions, payment receipts and correspondence relating to the implementation of the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program.

A. The State Development Office, with the advice of the Department of Finance and Administration, shall establish a standard accounting procedure to be used by any organization receiving moneys under this section.

B. The records of any organization pertaining to accounts and contracts funded with moneys under this section shall be open to audit by the State or by any firm employed by the State to audit these records.

6. Reimbursement procedures. Upon receipt in writing of satisfactory evidence of program progress and funds expended or committed, the Division of Tourism shall reimburse the organization according to a matching funds contract. Within 60 days of completion of the program, each grant recipient shall provide the Division of Tourism with the following:

A. A completed program evaluation report on a form supplied by the Division of Tourism;

B. Copies of all advertisements purchased;

C. Samples of any promotion material used in the program; and

D. Any other information requested by the Division of Tourism.

No additional matching funds may be awarded to an organization until the provisions of this subsection have been met.

§7007. Appropriation

The Legislature shall annually appropriate from the General Fund to the State Development Office the sums necessary to implement the programs established by the Division of Tourism and to operate the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program. Unexpended funds shall not lapse, but shall be carried forward.

§7008. Report to Legislature

The State Development Office, by January 15th, shall provide a progress and accounting report on the tourist industry of Maine and the effect of this industry on the State to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over State Government.

Any cigarette on which a tax has been paid, such payment being evidenced by the affixing of such stamp, shall not be subject to a

further tax under this chapter. Nothing contained in this chapter shall be construed to impose a tax on any transaction, the taxation of which by this State is prohibited by the Constitution of the United States.

Each unclassified importer shall, within 24 hours after receipt of any unstamped cigarettes in this State, notify the State Tax Assessor of the number of cigarettes received, and the name and address of consignee. The State Tax Assessor thereupon shall notify the unclassified importer of the amount of the tax due thereon, which shall be at the rate of 8 10 mills per cigarette. Payment of the amount due the State shall be made within 10 days from mailing date of notice thereof.

H.P. 1326 - L.D. 1761

AN ACT to Deter Drinking and Driving by Teenagers.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until the fall of 1983; and

Whereas, the lives of several teenagers have already been lost this year in alcohol-related accidents; and

Whereas, the combination of drinking and driving by underaged individuals inexperienced in both activities constitutes a real and immediate danger to the lives and safety of themselves and others on the Maine highways; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,
