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P R E F A C E

Volume 3 of the 1983 Laws of Maine contains all the laws and related papers enacted or approved at the Second Regular, Second Special and Third Special Sessions of the 111th Maine Legislature.

This official edition of the laws has been compiled and published pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 163-A, subsection 3.

The user may note some variance of type in these publications since December 9, 1982. During this period changes in printing laws resulted from developments of computer applications to legislative work. These changes introduced the production of camera-ready copy which, in addition to benefits of speed and accuracy, permitted printing at substantial savings over resetting type in hot metal. Hot metal printing of laws was last used in Chapter 536 of the Third Special Session of the 110th Legislature. Conversion to computer technology was made at the Second Regular Session of the 110th Legislature. A proportionately spaced type in essay style was first used, but then abandoned for lack of software development at the end of the Fifth Special Session of that Legislature. From the First Regular Session of the 111th Legislature to present day, courier fixed-spaced type has been consistently used in the program.

As Director of Legislative Research of the State of Maine, I attest that the session laws enacted by the 111th Maine Legislature at the Second Regular Session, Second Special and Third Special Sessions, as reported in this publication, have been compared with the engrossed acts deposited in the Office of the Secretary of State, are true copies, and are correctly printed.

This volume is arranged to convenience the user and suggestions for improvement are always welcome.
