CHAPTER 501

H.P. 453 - L.D. 654

AN ACT to Make Supplemental Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government, and to Change Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1985, June 30, 1986, and June 30, 1987.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

To act as executive officer of the Legislature when it is not in session and unless the Legislature shall otherwise order, he shall, with the cooperation of the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives have custody of all legislative property and material, arrange for necessary supplies and equipment through the State Bureau of Purchases, arrange for necessary services, make all arrangements for incoming sessions of the Legislature, have general oversight of chambers and rooms occupied by the Legislature and permit state departments to use legislative property. He shall, with the approval of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, dispose of surplus or obsolete material through the continuing property records section of the Bureau of Public Improvements. He shall approve accounts and vouchers for payment. A perpetual inventory of all legislative property shall be maintained under the supervision of the Legislative Council and an accounting thereof shall be made to the Legislature upon its request.

2. Supervision. To assign, direct and supervise, subject to the control of the council, the activities of the ~~offices of the Director of Legislative Research, the Legislative Finance Officer, Director of Legislative Assistants, Director of the~~ Maine-Canadian Legislative Advisory Office, the ~~Constituent Service Officer,~~ the State Law Librarian and such other legislative agencies and offices as may be

created by the Legislature legislative staff offices. The Executive Director shall have no supervisory authority with respect to any persons employed pursuant to chapter 1 or section 168 of this title;

2-A. Appointment of legislative staff. To appoint, upon recommendation of the appropriate office director and subject to the approval of the Legislative Council, qualified persons to legislative staff positions based solely on their ability to perform their duties and without regard to party affiliation. The general duties and compensation of these positions shall be established under the direction of the council and in accordance with organizational and performance objectives established by the council. These legislative staff positions shall be unclassified and not subject to the personnel law.

3. Vehicle for requests. To act as a vehicle through which the several agencies, departments and offices of the Legislature may report to the council their budget requests, personnel and supply requirements and to assist the council in the orderly disposition of these requests.

4. Policy implementation. To be responsible for implementing policy resulting from decisions of the council.

5. Reports. To prepare such reports as are required of the council and maintain minutes of the regular meetings of the council.

7. Other duties. To undertake such other duties as are assigned by the council.

Sec. 5. 3 MRSA §163-A is enacted to read:

§163-A. Legislative staff services

Legislative staff shall provide the following services under the direction of the Executive Director:

1. Bill drafting. To furnish to the members of the Legislature the assistance of expert draftsman qualified to aid the Legislature in the preparation of bills for introduction into the Legislature;

2. Revision. Upon request, to assist any agency appointed to revise the statutes of the State or any portion of the statutes and, at the direction of such agency, to consolidate, revise and clarify the statutes of the State;

3. Session laws. To prepare and index for printing as promptly as possible, after the adjournment of each session, the session laws, which compilation shall include all Acts and resolves which the Legislature has adopted during the session and which have received the approval of the Governor, when such approval is necessary, and any other material of a general nature that the Executive Director may determine;

4. Copy of public laws. After each session of the Legislature, to cause the public laws enacted at that session to be printed on good paper and in suitable type and to distribute the same within the State to all citizens making a request for those laws;

5. Pocket supplements. After each session of the Legislature, to cause to be published cumulative pocket supplements of the volumes of the Revised Statutes, and any replacement or recompiled volumes, which shall contain an accurate transcription of all public laws, the material contained in the next preceding pocket supplement, complete and accurate annotations to the statutes, appendix and other material accumulated since the publication of the next preceding pocket supplement and a cumulative index of that material;

6. Continuing revision. After each session of the Legislature, to prepare a report inserting in their proper places in the Revised Statutes public laws enacted since the last revision of the statutes and, after each subsequent session of the Legislature, to prepare a report supplementing the report so that those reports and supplements shall form the basis of the next revision of the statutes;

7. Committee assistance. To provide research, analysis and bill drafting assistance for joint standing or select committees, including, but not limited to, the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, the Joint Standing Committee on Audit and Program Review and other legislative agencies;

8. Reports and legislation. To prepare narrative reports on matters referred to joint standing committees for review or study and prepare legislation to be introduced pursuant to those reports;

9. Research services. To provide a comprehensive research service for Legislators, legislative joint standing or select committees and commissions and the Legislative Council;

10. Collection of fiscal information. To collect and assemble factual information concerning the fiscal affairs of the State for the use of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs of the Legislature in formulating its proposals for appropriations and to collect and assemble fiscal information concerning other revenue funds for the use of any joint standing committee in formulating proposals for allocation acts;

11. Appropriation requests. To examine all requests for appropriations made by the various agencies of State Government and attend any hearings necessary to obtain complete information;

12. Statement of costs. To prepare statements pertaining to the existence of cost or the amount of cost to municipalities or counties for implementing or complying with a proposed law. The statement of cost shall be made within the limits of information provided to the office designated by the Legislative Council as having responsibility for financial analysis. The statements shall be furnished to the appropriate committee for the information of its members and for inclusion in bills which receive an ought to pass report when reported by the committee. A statement shall not be necessary for any bill which has no cost to municipalities or counties; and

13. Other duties. To undertake such other duties as are assigned by the Executive Director.

3. Distribution, sale and exchange of law books. Copies of the Revised Statutes, supplements thereto and session laws shall be delivered by the printer to the State Law Librarian for distribution and sale in accordance with prices, policies and procedures established by the Legislative Council. ~~The State Law Librarian, shall fix the prices at which these items may be sold and delivered, and shall thereafter make sales at the prices fixed.~~ All proceeds from such sales shall be deposited to the credit of the General Fund.

A- A copy of all revisions of the statutes, and supplements thereto, and the session laws shall be sold at the established price to the following: Each free public library, college library, district attorney's office, county commissioner's court, sheriff's office, county treasurer's office, registry of deeds, registry of probate, office of a judge of probate and ex-Governor. Two copies shall be sold at the established price to each municipality.

A copy of all revisions of the statutes, and supplements thereto, and the session laws shall be furnished to each county law library, each Justice of the Supreme Judicial and Superior Courts, the office of each clerk of courts, each District Court, the office of the Governor, the office of the Reporter of Decisions, the office of the Judge of the United States District Court for Maine, the office of the United States District Attorney for Maine, the Library of the United States Court of Appeals for the first circuit, the office of each Senator and Representative from Maine in the Congress of the United States, the office of the Secretary of the Senate and the office of the Clerk of the House.

The Legislature, state administrative departments, bureaus, agencies and commissions, and the Judicial Department, shall be sold or furnished copies necessary for legislative, administrative or judicial purposes under rules and regulations promulgated by the State Law Librarian.

Copies shall be sent, on an exchange basis, to the Library of Congress, secretary of the Maine State Bar Association, the Supreme Court Library of Canada and to each state or territorial library in the United States.

One copy of the laws passed by each session of the Legislature shall be given to each Member thereof, the Secretary of the Senate, the Assistant Secretary of the Senate, the Clerk of the House and the Assistant Clerk of the House.

At any time prior to January 3, 1979, one copy of the latest unannotated revision of the statutes and any available supplement thereto shall be given to each Member of the Legislature who has not previously received such a copy as a Member of the Legislature which enacted the revision or a Legislature which met in regular session after the effective date of such revision of statutes.

On or after January 3, 1979, each Member of the Legislature may, while holding office, purchase at the state price or obtain on loan under rules and regulations promulgated by the State Law Librarian, the latest annotated revision of the statutes and the current supplement thereto.

The remaining copies of the revisions of the statutes, and supplements thereto, and the session laws shall be held in the library for ex-

change or library use, except as otherwise provided by law.

B. A copy of the printed decisions of the Supreme Judicial Court, commonly called Maine Reports, and of the advance sheets, which are purchased by the State in accordance with Title 4, section 702, shall be distributed by the State Law Librarian to the following: Each county law library, each college library, each district attorney's office, each office of a judge of probate, each registry of probate, each office of a clerk of courts, each District Court, the office of each Senator and Representative from Maine in the Congress of the United States, each Justice and ex-Justice of the Supreme Judicial and Superior Courts, the office of the Governor, the office of the Judge of the United States District Court for Maine, the office of the United States District Attorney for Maine, the office of the Clerk of the United States District Court for Maine and the office of each Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the first circuit.

Copies shall be sent, on an exchange basis, to the Library of Congress, secretary of the Maine State Bar Association, the Supreme Court Library of Canada, and to each state or territorial library in the United States.

Upon request of administrative officers thereof copies shall be placed in each state department or institution.

The Treasurer of State may participate in the securities loan market by loaning state-owned bonds, notes or certificates of indebtedness of the Federal Government, provided that the loans are fully collateralized by treasury bills or cash. The Treasurer of State shall seek competitive bids for investments except when, after a reasonable investigation, it appears that an investment of the desired maturity is procurable by the State from only one source. Interest earned on such investments of moneys shall be credited to the respective funds, except that interest earned on investments of special revenue funds shall be credited to the General Fund of the State. Interest earned on funds of the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife shall be credited to that fund. Interest earned on funds of the Baxter State Park Authority shall be credited to the Baxter State Park Fund. This section shall not prevent the deposit for safekeeping or custodial care of the securities of the several funds of the State in banks or safe deposit companies in this

State or any other state, nor the deposit of such state funds as may be required by the terms of custodial contracts or agreements as may be hereafter negotiated in accordance with the laws of this State. All custodial contracts and agreements shall be subject to the approval of the Governor.

Sec. 15. 5 MRSA §1742, sub-§20, ¶¶F and G, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 824, Pt. Y, are amended to read:

F. To levy charges against all units utilizing telecommunications services; and

G. To submit a budget of estimated revenues and costs to be incurred by the program in the same manner as required for the General Fund in chapters 145 and 149-; and

Sec. 16. 5 MRSA §1742, sub-§20, ¶H is enacted to read:

H. No telecommunications PBX's or key system may be installed in any geographical area which is now or may be served by a centralized switching system of the State telecommunications network, which will require unique number assignments or access dialing codes other than those used by the centralized switching system, unless specifically approved by the Telecommunications Division. Any such installations presently existing shall be made to conform to the above requirements if deemed economically feasible and desirable by the Telecommunications Division. All state entities shall comply with this paragraph unless specifically exempted in writing by the Director of the Bureau of Public Improvements.

Sec. 17. 10 MRSA §2365-A, first ¶ as enacted by PL 1983, c. 804, §8 is amended to read:

The state sealer has the authority to license all persons who measure or scale wood and has the authority to issue rules and establish fees for licensing and examination. Annual license fees shall not exceed \$25 and funds collected shall cover the expenses involved in administering the licensing process and other costs related to the administration of this section. No license to measure or scale wood may be issued to any person, unless that person successfully completes an examination as established by the state sealer. Once a licensing program is instituted then the following provisions of this section shall be in effect.

Sec. 18. 10 MRSA §§2365-B and 2365-C are enacted to read:

§2365-B. Persons licensed to measure and scale wood

Beginning September 1, 1985, there shall be at least one person licensed to measure and scale wood residing in each of the following 3 regions of the State: Aroostook County, Penobscot-Piscataquis Counties and Washington-Hancock Counties.

§2365-C. Persons enforcing laws relating to measurement of wood

Any employee of the State charged with enforcing the provisions of this chapter relating to the measurement of wood must be examined and licensed in accordance with the provisions of section 2365-A.

Sec. 19. 22 MRSA §3185, 3rd ¶, as amended by PL 1981, c. 463, Pt. H. §§ 1 to 3, is further amended to read;

Eligibility for, and aid through, this fund shall be on a year-to-year basis, and eligibility and amount of aid shall be determined only after the full application to the costs of medical care in any 12-month period of all applicable health care insurance benefits, other 3rd party payer benefits legally provided for or liability benefits identified as being for medical or rehabilitative care. From all net income before taxes received by the applicant or those legally responsible for the applicant's care, 30% will be assumed to be applicable to the liabilities for the care for which assistance is being sought. Where an individual is legally responsible for the medical liabilities of more than one applicant in a given year, no more than a total of 30% of his net income before taxes shall be assumed to be applicable to these liabilities. Ten percent of nonexcluded assets, as defined by the United States Supplemental Security Income Program, belonging to the applicant or those legally responsible for the applicant shall be assumed to be applicable to the liabilities for care. Eligibility criteria shall also incorporate the transfer of assets regulation governing eligibility for Supplemental Security Income and Medicaid. If, after the application of all of the above resources, the residual liability, in any one year, for which assistance is being sought is less than \$7,000, no payment shall be made from this fund and only that amount in excess of \$7,000 shall be paid. No reimbursements shall be made for bills already paid. Payments from this fund shall only be

made directly to the vendors or providers of care. This section shall not be deemed to create any rights or causes of action against the State in such a vendor or provider of care, his heirs or assigns. When eligibility has been established, the department may make payments from this fund, during the remainder of the year of eligibility, for those goods and services provided for in this section.

Sec. 20. 30 MRSA §554-A, sub-§5, as amended by PL 1983, c. 477, Pt. E, sub-pt. 6, §2, is further amended to read:

5. Compensation for assistant district attorneys. For the compensation of assistant district attorneys, the district attorneys shall be allowed annually sums up to the limit of \$29,520 plus 44¢ for each person constituting the population of his district according to the latest Federal Decennial Census until June 30, 1984, and \$30,996 plus 46¢ \$43,953.50 plus 55¢ for each person constituting the population of his district according to the latest Federal Decennial Census thereafter. In addition to the sums allowed in this section, funds shall be provided for fringe benefits for which other state employees are eligible.

Sec. 1. Expenditures in excess of allocations. Expenditures of other special revenue funds may, during the biennium, exceed legislatively-authorized allocations to provide for the costs of approved collective bargaining agreements or when failure to permit these additional expenditures could be reasonably expected to have a significantly detrimental effect upon ongoing programs. Appropriate adjustments to basic work programs facilitating these expenditures in excess of allocations must be recommended by the State Budget Officer and approved by the Governor. All adjustments necessitated by this section shall be subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs. Financial orders describing these adjustments shall be submitted by the Bureau of the Budget to the Legislative Finance Office 30 days before the adjustments are to be implemented. In case of extraordinary emergency adjustments, the 30-day prior submission requirement may be waived by vote of the committee. It is legislative intent that other special revenue funds shall be expended in accordance with the statutes that establish them and for no other purpose.

Reclassifications and salary increases for employees in other than the General Fund or the Highway Fund shall be paid from the fund in which the position is authorized.

Sec. 26. Vacant positions. No later than February 25th of each year the State Budget Officer shall submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs a list by program by fund of those positions that have been vacant for 6 months or more as of December 31st of the preceding year.

Sec. 27. Community development interim financing. There is allocated to the Conditional Commitment Account within the Federal Block Grant Fund \$7,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986, and \$7,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1986, and ending June 30, 1987, for the purpose of implementing the Interim Financing Program.

Sec. 28. Matching funds; Justice Assistance Act. Any general fund money appropriated for fiscal years 1985-86 and 1986-87 for Justice-Planning, Project and Statistics for Juvenile Justice and not appropriated for personal services may be used to match funds made available to the State pursuant to the Justice Assistance Act of 1984, Public Law 98-473, Chapter 6.

Sec. 29. Funds to be made available to Bureau of Health. The Department of Labor shall make available to the Bureau of Health funds sufficient to perform its responsibilities as required by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 26, chapter 22.
