land that it currently leases from the Department of Corrections in accordance with Resolve 1973, chapter 25, described as follows:

1. Beginning at a point on the northern side of the Dole Road and the easterly side of the River Road, at the conjunction of the town road side lines; thence in a northerly direction 1,000 feet along the eastern side of the River Road to a point, then easterly approximately 2,800 feet, plus or minus, to a point abutting a portion of the westerly boundary of the Herbert Hawkes property; thence to a point in a southerly direction 1,000 feet to the northerly boundary of the Dole Road to the point of beginning. The above parcel of land contains 66.6 acres, plus or minus; and be it further

Sec. 3. Land transferred to the Department of Finance and Administration. Resolved: That the approximately 124 acres of land to be sold for the appraised market value of the land as authorized by this resolve is transferred from the Department of Corrections to the Department of Finance and Administration for the purpose of conveyance to the Maine State Society for the Protection of Animals.

CHAPTER 81

H.P. 1706 - L.D. 2403

Resolve, for the Laying of the County Taxes
and Authorizing Expenditures of
Penobscot County for the Year 1986.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, Penobscot County has certain expenses and liabilities which must be met as they become due; and

Whereas, it is necessary that the taxes for the year 1986 hereinafter mentioned be immediately assessed in order to provide the required revenue for the county; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Sec. 1. Penobscot County; taxes apportioned. Resolved: That the following sum is granted as a tax on Penobscot County to be apportioned, assessed, collected and applied to the purposes of paying debts and necessary expenses of the county as authorized herein, and for other purposes of law, for the calendar year 1986:

Sec. 2. General Fund expenditures authorized. Resolve, Amending the Reporting Date of the
Joint Select Committee for Learning
Disabled Children.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the Joint Select Committee for Learning Disabled Children has been created by Resolve 1985, chapter 43, to examine the educational needs of and services available to learning disabled children in this State; and

Whereas, the recommendations of the committee will have an important long-range impact on the quality of the education received by this group of children; and

Whereas, in order to give adequate consideration to the educational problems of learning disabled children and to make sound, well-reasoned recommendations to the Legislature and the Governor, the committee needs adequate time to prepare its report; and

Whereas, the resolve creating the committee called for holding 3 public hearings and the submission of a report by January 1, 1986; and

Whereas, the committee was fully constituted and able to begin its work only by December 1985; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it
