P R E F A C E

The "Laws of Maine" is the official edition of the Legislative Session Laws of the State of Maine and is compiled and published pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 163-A.

To aid in the use of this publication of the Session Laws, the following information may be helpful.

1. This publication of the Laws of Maine 1985, Volume 1 and Volume 2, continue the Session Laws and related information from the First Regular and First Special Session of the 112th Legislature.

The Session Laws of the Second Regular, Second Special and Third Special Sessions of the 112th Legislature will follow in future volumes.

2. A table of contents which is designed to assist the user to locate major divisions and contents by page reference can be found at the beginning of the volume. Selected state papers, together with messages, addresses and proclamations of the Governor, may also be located by reference to page number within the table of contents.

3. At the top of each page is a running heading which indicates the individual classification of each law, the year and session of passage and its chapter number.

4. Words deleted from the law, unless repealed by express language, are denoted by strike-through type.

5. New words or sections are denoted by underlined type.

6. An individual subject index of session enactments arranged alphabetically by subject heading and chapter number to show changes made at the First Regular and First Special Sessions are located near the end of the volume.

7. A session cross reference table is also provided near the end of the volume to show how unallocated public laws, exempted in previous revisions and Titles and sections of the Revised Statutes of 1964 have been affected by the laws included in this publication.

8. Citations to a legislative document are printed beneath the chapter number to assist in locating the original source of each chapter.

9. It is important to note, due to failure to file approval on time, chapter 69 of the Public Laws of 1985 did not become effective. Also, chapter 81 of the Private and Special Laws has been purposely omitted as it was an unused number.

10. The effective date for Maine laws is provided in the Constitution of Maine, Article IV, Part Third, Section 16 as follows:

"No Act or joint resolution of the Legislature, except such orders or resolutions as pertain solely to facilitating the performance of the business of the

Legislature, of either branch, or of any committee or officer thereof, or appropriate money therefor or for the payment of salaries fixed by law, shall take effect until ninety days after the recess of the session of the Legislature in which it was passed, unless in case of emergency, (which with the facts constituting the emergency shall be expressed in the preamble of the Act), the Legislature shall, by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, otherwise direct. An emergency bill shall include only such measures as are immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety; and shall not include (1) an infringement of the right of home rule for municipalities, (2) a franchise or a license to a corporation or an individual to extend longer than one year, or (3) provisions for the sale or purchase or renting for more than five years of real estate.”

The effective date of nonemergency laws passed at the First Regular Session of the 112th Legislature, unless expressly provided otherwise, is September 19, 1985. Likewise, all laws that passed at the First Special Session of the 112th Legislature, unless otherwise provided, become effective on February 12, 1986.

Individual revisions of departmental laws are not included in the “Laws of Maine” but may be available upon request from the respective departments.

Each volume has been prepared and arranged for the user’s convenience and any comments or suggestions which may lead to the improvement of the publication are welcomed.
