CHAPTER 11

S.P. 434 — L.D. 1313

AN ACT to Provide Required Matching Funds for Federal Disaster Assistance Funds Expected to be Available to the State.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, as a result of extensive spring flooding, significant portions of the State have been declared eligible for federal disaster assistance funds; and

Whereas, these funds are required to be matched by state and local contributions; and

Whereas, in order to ensure the receipt of these funds in as timely a manner as possible so that efforts to repair flood damage may be maximized, it is deemed to be in the overall best interests of the people of the State that required matching funds be provided from available state resources; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. Provision of matching funds. Notwithstanding the language in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1513, the funds appropriated in this Act are intended to provide the State Government and local government shares of such funds as necessary to match federal disaster assistance funds approved for the State.

Sec. 2. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the Rainy Day Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

Sec. 3. Funds to carry. Funds appropriated in this

Act shall not lapse, but shall carry forward until all applications qualifying under the guidelines for applicable disaster assistance programs have been processed. Any portion of these funds not expended for the disaster declared by the Governor in his proclamation of April 1, 1987, shall be returned to the Rainy Day Fund.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

Effective April 23, 1987.

CHAPTER 12

H.P. 862 — L.D. 1155

AN ACT to Create a Youth Fisheries and Wildlife Conservation Education Program.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, this pilot program should be in effect from early July to late August; and

Whereas, it is imperative that our secondary students learn about wildlife and wildlife management; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. Pilot program. The Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife with support and assistance of the Department of Conservation's SERVE Maine Program shall conduct a pilot program for secondary high school students to increase student awareness and understanding of fisheries and wildlife management principles and practices.

Ten secondary school students shall be selected annually to assist specific inland fisheries and wildlife and conservation law enforcement projects being undertaken by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife. The program shall be for a 6-week to 8-week period during the summer recess.

To be eligible, the students must be between the ages of 15 and 18 years, enrolled in the freshman through junior years in a secondary school in the State and possess a Maine driver's license and be capable of providing their own transportation to the site of the project which they are assigned, unless public transportation is available.
